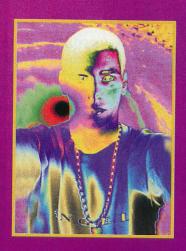
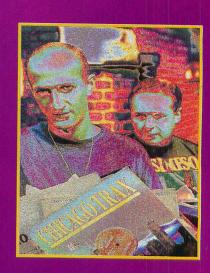

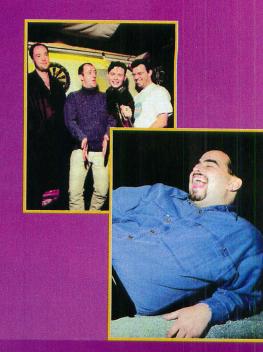

Out on 5th December and guaranteed to be big! Don't miss your chance!



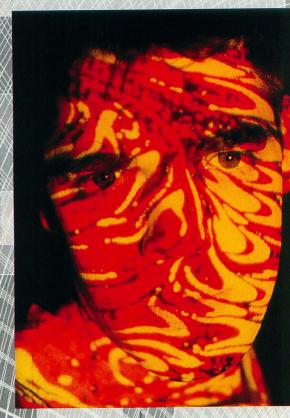
The Eauzone Club in Woolwich, London is the latest in a line of venues from the

Hard Trance Vol. 2

One of the most essential compilations of this, or indeed any other year, was the superb 'Hard Trance & Psychedelic Techno offering from London based Phantasm Records. Now, they're back with a second volume of muscular trance and tripped-out techno. Well known for their exuberant live show, Medicine Drum kick-off this new offering with the gorgeous 'Alpha rising' - A rippling, percussive-led workout which sets the tone for much of what follows. With contributions from the likes of Pob, Art of Trance (Cambodia, again!), Man With No Name and Prana, this is a compilation which delivers exactly what the title promises. Fifteen tracks of sparkling, high quality techno. The perfect gift for Christmas? You bet!

Charlene

...is one of Canada's best kept secrets. She is capable of producing anything from heartfelt ballards to uptempo house grooves. She is five feet, eleven inches tall, has exotic looks, she is going to go far...

Steve Goddard: Tell me about your childhood. Were you from Canada originally? Charlene Smith: Yes. I was born in Brantford, Ontario, but have also lived in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia.

SG: Tell me about your singing interests as a youngster.

CS: Well now, I can remember vividly, when I was four years old, how annoying Mrs. Cork was, when I joined a kindergarten choir. She constantly asked me to sing quieter or not at all. I sang really loud in order to make the others give it their all, so to speak, and sing as

a group! She wrote on my report that I had a beautiful singing voice when I could 'contain' myself, meaning I was basically a show-off.

SG: What about your musical influences?

CS: Oh, it was all mostly Motown. My parents would argue and it would end up in a fight, then one of them would go downstairs, put the record player on and play Motown songs. Sometimes I'd come home and there they'd be, smooching on the sofa and they'd listen to the same records! The Temptations and the Supremes, they were so soulful, they were like an escape route to me, y'know? A kind of a comfort zone, I suppose.

SG: So when did you start to gain recognition?

CS: Late. I was about fifteen years old and this shady producer/songwriter helped me to record some songs. He told me he could get me a deal with Cherry Beach records in Toronto. But it turned out there was no deal. He used me as a vehicle to promote himself. Needless to say this experience was lodged in my mind, hopefully never to be repeated! It was much later still when I signed up with one of Canada's most exciting and outlandish labels, Boomtang, and that's when things started to happen for me. It was then that I signed to Indochina, which is my biggest musical success to date.

SG: And it was with Indochina that you recorded "Good times" and "Learned My Lesson". "Good times" is, incidentally, one of my favourite toons this year, (Charlene replies, "Why thank you!"). Are you happy with the direction you're taking?

CS: Absolutely. "Good times" to me was a minor success the world over. "Learned my lesson" was purely a therapeutic thing and if you listen to the lyrics, they tell you to give more to yourself as well as to others. I like to keep the soul in my music but as you know "Learned" came in a house mix as well, which I liked immensely. It's good to be a little progressive and continue to keep both variations incorporated in my sound.

SG: When can we expect the next single?

CS: Well, the Boomtang boys, that's Rob DeBoer, Paul and Tony Grace have just finished the album mix of "Too much for me "and are currently working on the singles' remixes, due in a few months, preceding the soon completed album in the new year, which is taking up all our spare time at the moment.

SG: Just how good is the working environment with-in your production team?

CS: It's a spiritual awakening! The four of us bonded together straightaway and Robbie and I communicated on another level. He's a co-writer of all of the songs and he musically knew what I lyrically felt. I took a week off work to begin the album and sometimes I'd fall asleep during mix downs where we worked day and night to get as



much done as possible. They've got incredible patience. I wanted to try everything to express myself in certain styles.

SG: What do you think of the R&B scene in Britain?

CS: I think it's refreshing. More and more music magazines are riding R&B charts now in Britain and think of the possibilities! Instead of R&B artists doing remixes to get into the dance charts, dance acts may now get to try R&B mixes to score in the R&B scene.

SG: What's your next step?

CS: Oh, I guess I'll move to England. I'm spending extended periods of time there and if the album does well then I'll look forward to moving. I can appreciate Britain's musical versatility and lack of snow (ha-ha!) But I like the challenge of having to adapt. My Canadian and personal isolation would continue a pattern of learning that I'm familiar with and all the feelings that go with it.

SG: It goes without saying, you're an extremely attractive girl. Do you find time for romance? (Charlene laughs and hesitates, embarassed) CS: Unfortunately, in romance, I give more than I take, so I've learned to be romantically independant. At this point in my life 'romance' is a distraction. Besides, I'm married to my music. I will say though that I've got a very special connection to Lennox Lewis. I've known him for a long time and I've watched him go from being an ambitious 'friend' to a man who has likewise dedicated most of his life to his career. He best represents what I'd look for in a partner, you know, when 'the' time comes...un-afraid, takes the ups with the downs and quite literally, takes and rolls with the punches. He's now looking forward to watching his ambitious friend make some of her dreams come true!

SG: So, can you tell me, what would you most like to be doing this time next year?

CS: Touring...no question. Either on the road with a band, doing the club circuits, or opening for Michael Jackson, but I guess, I'm not really that fussy!

SG: And long distance?

CS: Let me see. Maybe in ten years time I hope to be in a Swiss cottage penning lyrics for my sixth, no, maybe that's cocky...let's say my fifth album. Hopefully by then I will be well-established as an innovative songwriter/performer. Up there with the likes of some of my other musical influences, like Chaka Khan, Vesta Williams, Melissa Morgan, The Emotions and guys like Charlie Wilson (Gap Band) and Earth Wind and Fire. I want to be able to hold my listeners interest in me as long as they all have.

Looking and listening to Charlene's beautiful features and voice, I've no doubt she will encourage her ever growing leagues of fans (and Lennox) to follow her well into the new century. I know one thing is for sure - I'll be in the front-row everytime. Steve Goddard

Bloated

Outside a converted warehouse scores of teenage urchins and juvenile delinquents blow hot air into the newly freezing atmosphere. Inside, a steaming mug and a plate of bacon and eggs is projected mockingly onto one wall. Hot milky tea, fried breakfast; as typically English as over-indulgence. Hence Bloated, a monthly assemblage from the harder range of the technologic spectrum, hosted at the Riverside venue in Newcastle by Nick Denton and Jim Mawdsley. Since Bloated kicked off eighteen months ago, it has proved to be the only Techno club of merit in the north-east. A demanding audience has been rewarded with a consistently varied register of innovative djs, willing to take chances, and all playing the club for love of music, not money.

Craig Walsh was an early coup, being an acquaintance of many moons. Lord Sabre of Paradise quickly followed, fired by favourable reports. Andrew Weatherall's delivery of pummelling industrialism always surpasses expectation. His rapier mixing broods between cold dark noise and minimalistic subterranean tracks from years ago. The hurricaning acid vibrations, shrill metallic noises and thunderous techno, all testify to the collapse of the Industrial Revolution. Metal bars are clanging to the ground, vibrating through space, finally echoing inside your head. This freaked out techno is Grade A electro-punk music. Total psychedelic violence.

As befits this motion and machine aesthetic, Techno remains precisely balanced between speed and chaos, between utopia and dystopia. Alex Knight, the advance scout for domestic electronic noise, has twice offered uniquely sophisticated almost cryptic mixing, lay-

ering obscure musical elements in combination with wild new sounds. Irish champion David Holmes delivered unembroidered sound, just basic essential noise. Sampled tribal beats and African poly-rhythms collided with tin drum cacophonies and urban street acid. Chief Orbster, Alex Patterson, span his merry way through a boxful of brightly coloured vinyl. Dutch trio of audio-engineers, Psychick Warriors ov Gaia, displayed the living power of metabolic alchemy. Juan Atkins, the Detroit master, played worldwide tracks with agility, merging disparate styles together into waves of sound, peaking then tumbling beneath the futuristic abstract electro noises of new skool sci-fi. Twitch and Brainstorm (of Edinburgh's Pure) journeyed south to present their idiosyncratic soundclash. Plastikman Richie Hawtin crossed the oceans from Canada for a relentless night of audio adventure. For many visitors however, the freshest discovery is the resident dj Nick Denton. Bloated is literally a platform for this man's ingenuity. from the mild-edged psychedelic techno of Australia to teutonically industrialised noise, the sinister and seductive travelogues he offers up reveal haunting dreamscapes, radical interpretations of inner city hostility. Hard, fast and dark, Denton plays Techno, deeper, hotter and sexier than anyone else. Flicking between hipwiggling vibes from Chicago and old skool style from Detroit, this man is one of the most dexterous disc manipulators in the country.

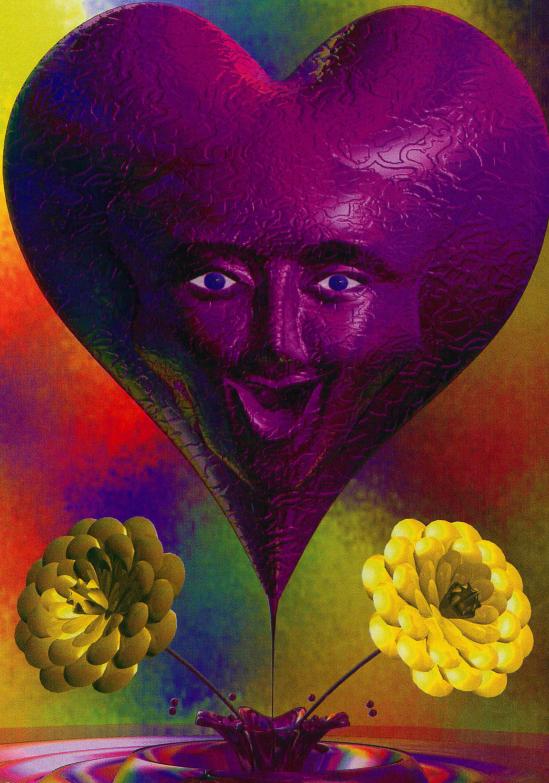
There is no reason why contemporary music shouldn't be challenging, exciting and inventive. As the crowd know, Rhythm is Rhythm after all. So people come to Bloated primarily to dance. On the dancefloor is a vociferously excited, mixed crowd of wiggers and gigglers. Creative and hedonistic, the underground children of the inner cities adapt, combine and recreate to nurture a neo-urban music with a lotech cut and paste aesthetic. In the escape-room, Dub Revelation Hi-Fi feed dubplates from a single turntable, through a variety of archaic effects units to create voluptuous echo chambers. On stage minimalist trancers Ixlan negotiate new sonic spaces, with the individualistic panache of futurist renegades. It's all a dishevelled daydream of techno brigandage in bobble hats. Nights of strobes, smoke and sweat. Big, Bad, Beautiful: Bloated.

The British Techno scene has been largely defined by one man - DAVE ANGEL. So why is he still residing in Techno Nomansland? VEENA VIRDI donned her stomping boots and went in search of the man creating lush intricacies in deepest South London.

The decibels within the council flat are at a screeching, rusty, pneumatic drill level. But the noise isn't urban feedback. It isn't even sampled discordia rolling from a DAT tape. It's from a couple of toddlers shrieking their lungs out. Noise pollution afflicts Dave Angel! So much so in fact that it's probably been an indirect influence on his DJing set.

"I was in Scotland the other night and playing to between three to four thousand 17-25 year olds. So naturally they want it real hard. And I still get off on music like that. I like to hear a good hit of

sequencing, when I'm DJing."

One of the anonymous doors within the flat belies its actual utility function. Normally it would be a neglected four by four junk room, But in Dave's flat it is his studio, his retreat. But even there the wall insulation cannot stop the extraneous caterwauling seeping through. Whilst Dave partakes in some nondescript chit-chat, his five year old son, Daine, bursts through the door to check on his father . He gazes at the studio equipment. To him they hold the awe of forbidden fruit. Dave ushers him out before he starts his onslaught of probing questions-the type that only

kids have the nerve to ask. Daine's curiosity reminds

Dave of his own at that age.

"I'd be at the corner just hanging around, just listening' to the conversations between my father and his friends about jazz music. Then I'd hang around and start playing the drums by banging anything I cold get my hands on. I'd even forge dinner tickets so I would get out of class early to go to the drum block. Finally my father got me a drum kit and I had it in my bedroom'

Dave never discounts his father's jazz influence, whether it was from exposing him to Miles Davis and John Coltrane or making sacrifices such as having the electricity cut off when his father bought him his first drum kit. Although Dave rapidly graduated onto session drumming at the precocious age of fourteen, his interest was sidetracked during his teenage years. I was just being a teenager, but I found my interest again when my father died. It's kinda like that."

Rolling his eyes, Dave is all too aware that circumstances haven't changed since then. His drums are no longer in his bedroom, but his studio is a permanent habitue."Nothing's really changed, even if I'm noticed a bit more. But that doesn't really matter as I'd still be doing this."

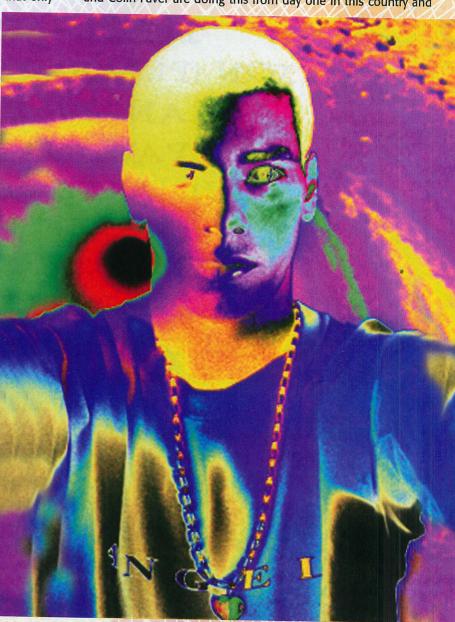
All this, however, is treading over old ground. There have been volumes of copy which have focused on the death of his father and the way it motivated him to investigate the possibilities within electronic music. This resulted in The Eurythemic's remix of Sweet Dreams which caused enough of a ruckus to elevate him up to No 23 of the charts and incurred the wrath of a certain Miss Lennox. After this initial, short-lived success he had to slug it out in relative obscurity, some of it spent on a nine month imprisonment term for the possession of cannabis. But these are topics that Dave is now reluctant to elaborate on-they're old ghosts that need to be left to lie. He could easily let bitterness get the upper hand if he ruminated over the

way events unfolded, seeing himself as a 'victim' of an unjust society. Dave is perceptive enough to see, however, that this line of thinking could only act as an impediment to his work.

Y'know I just wanna stay away from politics. Just get on with my life and do my music really. No matter what I say, they're not going to change things. The Government's in control man, and it doesn't matter what a thousand of me say. You're promised all this shit and nothing happens." He guffaws, "I just wanna make my music, man."

As much a statement of confidence as a statement of fact, Dave as main prioritization is adding flaky layers to his percussive millefeuille. But there's still that niggling itch of being underrated-not receiving his quid pro quo from the music press which has only covered his work with scant missives. But then EPs such as The Family, Royal Techno and Third Voyage and his effort on the Trance Europe Express compilation with Life's Little Pleasures might be a mite too leftfield for Joe Public. This is Detroit Techno cudgelled with a fretting, European, Hardcore hammerbeat. This was the type of material that Colin Dale and Colin Faver effused about during British Techno's embryonic

'People say to me, 'You're music is too difficult for people to get their heads around. That's why I'm not recognised. I kinda see myself as a DJ's DJ or as a producer's producer. That's why the man on the street might find my music a bit intimidating. Even though Techno is the buzzword, people like me, Colin Dale and Colin Faver are doing this from day one in this country and

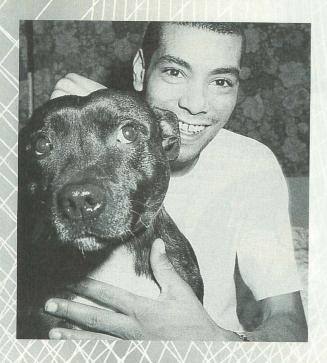

we're still not recognised for it."

Going for gripes galore, Dave also feels that accolades recently bestowed on Detroit's pioneers are just token gestures. What's the point of a few half-hearted salutes to the likes of Derrick May, Kevin Saunderson and Juan Atkins?

"Mad Mike's, Carl Craig's and Eddie Fowlkes's music really does something for me. I know it really does something for them because they are in touch with it. So why don't the press give them what they're due. But saying that, that's the politics of music." With emphatic gesticulations, "That's something that I don't want to get involved in. I think the music always comes out in the end."

That's why Dave is still incredulous at the mention of being 'Father of the British Underground' or a British Carl Craig.

"Me. Nah! I don't believe that. I see myself as a part of it, but I wouldn't see myself as a father of it and all that, 'I'm the creator' business. Nah, I'm Dave Angel!"

It's this intransigent outlook that creates the arena for Dave to conduct his own electro-symphonies. This process allows the strains of strings to tie knots into a complicated, audio tapestry. This is definitely apparent in EPs like Seas Of Tranquillity released on his fledgling label Rotation. Dave exclaims that the stimulus behind Rotation is to release 'full-bloodied, 'melodic Techno with a groove.' Playing a rough draft titled 'Test Patterns' by one of the artists on the label, Paul Hazel, the opulent looping, the sweeping inter connections and the respite of a raising harmony, trademarks that are usually found in Dave's own tracks also characterise his production. Intermittent intrusions litter most of his numbers. Yet his new EP is sparse in its execution. But then In Flight EP wasn't coloured by his crammed, home-life milieu, but the mileage accumulated from travelling when he is DJing. This accounts for the tracks being christened 'Take Off', 'Airborne', 'Keeping On' and 'Arrival'. What's missing is 'Jet Lag'.

"No, there's no 'Jet Lag'," he intones. "That'll leave you feeling like shit."

Which is the last thing this track does. This EP is his first project for Island after his split from R&S earlier this year. He tries to convince himself that the separation was amicable.

"When R&S and Island both gave in quotes, I preferred island's. That's what it's all about really. R&S are kinda OK." Then in an outburst, "I don't want to say anything bad about them, but our time just went sour. So I moved on. I wasn't signed to R&S,

"When I'm playing stompin' hard techno, you don't see any women there at all."

I just worked for my royalties and that was that. Also I wanted to concentrate on Rotation."

Also aligned to this is his DJing work, especially at clubs like The Orbit, In leeds, his remixing work which include Sun Electric's En Trance and the club he promotes, The Rotary Club.With a policy to, "promote the label and the music," it also endeavours to entice more women down to break up the sweaty throng of testosterone that dominates the floors of most techno Clubs:

"That's when I'm playing stompin' hard Techno, you don't see any women there at all. So I wanna start something different. As the bpms are not so fast, women can dress up, go out and have a good dance. That's what I wanted really."

For a moment there are no distractions. Dave has confronted the fact that this is what he really needs, especially since he has plans to start his album.

"I'll start the album as soon as I move out of London. I've had enough . My previous house in Clapham got burgled, so I'm moving to Wiltshire. I'm not only thinking about me, but I'm thinking about my son as well. Also I need space for my studio. And with all the sirens going off and news about policemen being shot I just thought this is not what I need. Things are getting out of hand."

Dave's not going to wait to find out if Stockwell degenerates into the South Bronx. Enough is enough. On a wistful note, "I never used to feel like that, until someone put a brick through my kitchen window. I kinda feel I'm not safe anymore. When I'm away DJing I worry about my wife and child. I need to be more relaxed."

For one thing the louche elegance of Dave's music is reams apart from the grim reality of high -rise urbania and metropolitan frustrations. The police siren goes off in the distance. Dave's escape is his music-it's his only getaway. Veena Verdi

Incubator

Nursuring new talent



Conceived in July 1993 and born the following August, Sperm Records are a label not quite like any other. You see, at present, virtually all the production work is done in house.

Andy Chatterley and Richard Schiessl slaved for their own cause for the best part of a year, not only running the label but producing every piece of music that was released. After the success of Boomerang's first single 'Catch It' in February of this year the label started creating serious interest from the media.

"In many ways it's harder to get off on your own stuff than somebody else's," says Andy, "But I can remember one time being in Megatripolis when '3 Minute Warning' by Yum Yum bellowed out of the speakers. As soon as it came on my legs froze, I was completely unable to hold it together."

By April their office was buzzing. So much so that it was getting in the way of their real love - making tunes happen, "So much of our time was spent answering phones and chasing invoices that very little in the way of music was coming out of the studio," explains Richard. "Release dates were too far away from each other and we were frightened that the buzz we had created would simply fizzle out. We decided to bring someone in, to centralise the outfit. Nicol became available at the right time and now we are a much more professional unit."

So what does the future hold for this spunky label? "Our main aim now is to seek out new talent and sign it to Sperm. And also to work with as many different types of artist as possible," starts Nicol. "When you are making all your own stuff it does give you the best control you could possibly ask for, but it is also a bloody slow process. So right now we are setting up an A&R department. There is no way we would ever give up making tunes ourselves, but it would be nice to be able to share what we have here with other like minded souls."

New releases from Yum Yum and Boomerang scheduled for early '95.

Caustic Visions do not release records with the ulterior motive of making heaps of cash. Obviously like most labels they realise that certain costs have to be met when taking on the responsibility of producing vinyl, but as long as expenses are covered each time, then there is nothing more to worry about. This might encourage yawns of cynicism at such trite label morals designed as a smoke screen for less romantic intentions, but take a closer look at their avant-guarde creations and prepare to confront the foundation of their argument.

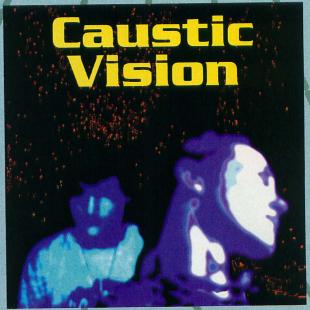
"The music we make is our hobby. We both have jobs and it would be unrealistic to jack them in for a musically orientated career at the moment. The music we create is not really designed to fit into any particular category or subscribe to proved formulae, but it was essentially to make something that will sound new and original. We have ideas that we would like to explore with sound, developing strange, unorthodox concepts. The possibility of getting them released onto vinyl however, depends on whether this would be a practical move for us, particularly when no other label around at the moment releases stuff like this.

As artists we are interested in developing new structures for techno, such as breaking down the rigidness of adhering to preplanned arrangements or standard four to the floor formats."

This is an attitude that is dominant throughout their releases to date. Their most recent 7 track EP is just about to hit the streets with tracks 'Malice' and 'CV through 202' set to cause a stir, but when prompted as to the dark ambient nature of some of the tracks...

"I wouldn't really consider the tracks to be dark ambience. We don't really set out to make ambi-

ent tracks as such, it's more a case of trying to create tunes without adhering to an obvious beat. It allows us and the listener to get totally immersed in the sounds themselves, providing something that with several listens reveals new unseen elements. This is often done by the use of samples from real world technology itself, such as the sounds produced by hitting drainpipes etc. However our latest EP



does witness an increase in the use of standard studio machines, but bearing in mind that these machines are popular with many producers, we've tried to obtain a new feel from them."

Caustic Visions are Tom Spragg and Tim Evans and their new EP, 'Green Microdots/CV3303 can be found for a limited period in all techno specialists shops. Warlock "A big part of what we do as a band, is the way we use the studio," says Sean Johnstone of Flash Faction. As well he might, since the other three members of the outfit, Matt Nelmes, Richard Johnstone and Jake Davies, are all engineers at London's prestigious Berwick Street Studios. Flash Faction's vigorous and fresh approach to techno was first defined on their debut for Labello Trax, 'Robot Criminal', which married studio wizardry

with comprehensive dancefloor sensibilities, courtesy of Sean who also di's at the well-rated Quirky in Brixton's Vox. They followed up with the critically acclaimed 'Repo Man' on Sabres of Paradise, a neat slice of post-existential groove which paid homage to Alex Cox's finest moment.

Also forthcoming on Sabres in the New Year is 'Swarm'. A glorious synthesis of dub, classical and techno which revisits Flash Faction's eclectic influences, 'Swarm' is evidence of the wider shift in dance music towards a broader range of source material. "We were all dubheads before we got into house music," explains Sean. "In the studio, we try to incorporate

the way that a dub producer would play the desk and apply that process to modern music. At the moment, we're heavily into Basic Channel and a lot of the Chicago stuff, like Dancemania, particularly the way the beats are constructed in that very minimal way. But we're also taking a lot of influences from garage, the way that rhythms are swung and so on. We're trying to make our sound a lot funkier."

In the meantime, Flash Faction are back with a new single, 'Roadhog', on Third Mind Records. An intriguing techno-dub mantra, 'Roadhog' follows on from their previous outing from the label, the wonderfully-titled 'Bad Moog Rising', and combined their fascination with other styles alongside a colossal, speed-thrill techno workout. Put simply, it's brilliant. 'One of those records which comes with a guaranteed 'search out at all costs' recommendation, 'Roadhog' revises the parameters of trance techno. Backed with the superb 'Experiments in Truth', it's an indication that Flash Faction are among the more adventurous outfits on the scene.

"We're working on an album that's not at all what people will expect," concludes Sean. "It's basically an exploration of our Flash
Faction

influences. So there's a couple of dub tracks, a hip-hop track, some electro and some house as well as a load of bangin' techno on it. We want to make records that are accessible to other people. Although they're hard and forward-looking, we want our records to be played in contexts other than just techno clubs." *Tim Barr*

Sim Bowring, aka Pentatonik, is safe within his own cocooned studio, which is lip-smackingly close to the River Thames. It is a perfect place to hide from the world especially since the currents undulating towards the studio's walls sound so reassuring. But Sim cannot stop exterior influences from infiltrating his work. His synthetic symphonies may have a polished sheen but that's before a jutting, discordant inconsistency trips you up. This is music at its most malevolent.

The huge abstract painting by occasional drummer Joe Macrae hanging in the studio, undercuts the confusion around it. Sim is no stranger to art having studied Fine Art and Video at St. Martin's and Camberwell before ditching it for music. He constantly draws comparisons between this painting and his own work.

"It reminds me of certain elements in my music. In this painting there are a lot of layers and a kind of organic element - a controlled roughness. I think this is what happens in my music."

After three years of assembling, structuring and searching for truth, Sim sees the construction of his music as the complete antithesis to everything post-modernism stands for.

"Post-modernism is the regurgitation of the Twentieth Century and all it entails. My approach is really the opposite of that. It's more modernistic as I don't sample adverts or other records. The visual analogy would probably be an abstract painting. I'm very interested in producing a stream of work that has a linear qual-

ity to it."

Sim follows the Reich, Glass, and Stockhausen school of avant-garde rather than the ambient dabblings of Paul Schutze or David Toop. Freestyle Techno is another cachet that irks Sim, because of the spurious claims to impulsive spontaneity. Sim doesn't see how good music can be created by just hammering it out. Instead he believes inspirational music ferments over time. "It's the only way to achieve a greater understanding of the music I'm producing and the way it affects people."

The first, tentative steps to attaining this aim are stored within the Anthology LP, which is a collection of three EPs, two of them reworkings of the previously released Autonomous and Re:solution EPs, and four extra tracks. The tracks cover the last three years but, "with 1994 production." Sim sees the album as a reference point to later work. As the album is split into four parts they also reflect four contrasting emotional states. Sim believes that his childhood in Derby influences his formative years.

"As a child I used to go running around the fields and then I'd play the piano. This is why there is a real sense of space in my music. I think I'd be writing a different sort of music if I'd spent my childhood years in the city. I do like having natural light in my studio, because I think my inspiration comes from natural things. See the sky at the moment, it'd be nice to do a mix when you see a nice sky."

It's this sort of intensity that is evoked in Sim's compositions. "Something on the new album that I will be experimenting with more



is space and silences." Another area that Sim wants to revolutionise is the live experience. A visible figure on the Megadog, Occilate and Trance Europe Express gig circuit, Sim has plans for his live shows to lean towards a more, "impressionist angle," which calls for simplicity rather than, "bombarding the audience with highs and lows."

London could be splitting at its own seams, but Sim seems to be immune from this in his own little corner. The continual lapping of the waves is a comforting decoy. "That's what's nice about down here. It's quiet. There's just the sound of the water and you can watch the boats tow past." Veena Verdi

Pictures by Simon King Words by Oliver Swanton orty-one pumping, kicking, wicked tracks straight from the country's finest dance-floors direct to your home via three CDs or tapes," raps Adrian LuvDup. (The creative process is a torturous one and for this forty-five second radio commercial, it might just turn out to be all too much for everyone involved.) Adrian's 'Now 94-cheesy-Telestar' version is rejected on the grounds that radio stations won't accept it in fear of upsetting the big advertisers the version takes the piss out of.

In it's place a Smith and Jones-esque tongue-in-cheek discussion about their mix tapes' overwhelming value for money is recorded: "Well chaps," opens Graeme, "remember those mix tapes we did?"

"Yeah," answers Mike C, in a serious Whispering Bob Harris kinda voice, "the ones with tracks by Pizzaman, Direckt, and Chubby Chunks." "And Bottom Dollar, Roger Sanchez, and Sub Sub," adds Adrian. "How much do you think they're being sold for then?" asks Graeme..... etc.

The radio ad is simple, but very effective. It's funny and for club DJs they've all got good voices, especially Mike C, who wouldn't seem out of place on Radio Four. It took a surprisingly short time to sort out - from creation and scripting to actual recording. The process wasn't too torturous and after some tape cutting, chopping and general studio wizardry the end result will no doubt sound very professional and not at all like the recording I heard.

The House Collection (Volume One) will be out in plenty of time for Christmas and, although I hate to say it, it is good value for money. Three hours of mixing on three tapes for only £10.99 has to be a bargain in anyone's books. The long and lucrative trade in bootleg mix tapes and the huge number of compilation albums sold every year must make the venture a sure-fire winner for Fantazia. I wouldn't have put a semi-clad woman on the cover myself, but then I'm not in the marketing game! (Toni Egan has also featured in the tabloids, wearing even less - a rising starlet to be sure.)

After all their hard work in the studio selling "product" to invisible punters the last thing I wanted to do was ask Graeme Park, Adrian LuvDup, and Mike C anything about the tapes themselves. Instead I decided to ask them a whole load of questions about 1994 and turn the feature into a year's round up - this is the December issue after all.

Can you name one natural disaster from 94?

GP: "Ferries going down aren't natural disasters are they?"

MC: "I'm sure a volcano erupted somewhere."

AL: "The famine in Rwanda will do won't it?"

GP: "There's the plague in India. I was there in fact - last Christmas I was in Rajistan in Northern India. They've got these new mosquitoes that give you brain damage when they bite you. I'm not planning to go back."

Did you write to your MP about the Criminal Justice Bill?

GP: "Sadly I didn't and I have a pathetic excuse - I've just moved from Lambeth to Westminster and I don't know who my new MP is, he's probably a Tory anyway. I might do it next week because I've got a week off and I'll be in Scotland so I can sit down quietly and write something interesting. This is a real incentive actually and I should do it because it's an outrageous piece of legislation." **AL:** "I don't know who my MP is either and I'm scared to contact him in case he asks me about my Poll Tax bill for the last five years."

MC: "I didn't write to any MPs, but I did go on the marches."

Did anyone buy some of the new CD turntables?

GP: "I haven't bought any, but I've been testing out the Pioneer ones and they're absolutely brilliant. The problem is that by the time all the stuff I play comes out on CD I'm not playing it anymore, and I'm not in to doing this oldie night rubbish."

Are you on-line and if so what do you think of it?

AL: "It doesn't really appeal to me, but Mark LuvDup really wants

to get into it. Mark's fascinated by it all."

GP: "When I get my flat and my life sorted out it's something I'd like to consider. When I worked out at the Logic studios in Frankfurt the guy from Snap was in his office playing on the Internet all night. He was calling up bulletin boards and downloading his own Snap samples for anyone in the world to listen to - it was interesting to watch."

What was the furthest you travelled for a gig this year?

MC: "The other end of the country - Scotland."

AL: "The other side of the world to Sydney for the Fantazia parties."

GP: "Australia as well, different Fantazia tour though."

Did you go to Ibiza this year and if so was it as shit hot as the media said it was?

GP: "Now I've never been to Ibiza before and I use to be very proud of the fact because every bugger and his best mate seems to go there. Over the past few years the people who've come up to me in clubs and say, "fucking 'ell Parky I can't believe you 'aven't been to Ibiza, it's fuckin' bangin' out there" have acted as the best advert for not going. However, having said all that, this year I was persuaded to go by Cream and Deconstruction. Although I was reluctant to go I had a fucking excellent time. It was absolutely brilliant and I'm gutted to fuck that I'd not been out before this year. I'll be going next year."

AL: "I was an Ibiza virgin until this year as well. All the old veterans were going "it's not as good as it was," but that's bollocks, I had a great time. Old codgers always harp on about yesteryear, in the good old days when they had no TV to amuse themselves..."

MC: "I went a few years a go, but not this year."

Did you buy Whigfield and if not who did?

GP: "I didn't buy it, but it got sent. I got about a minute into it and it went right out of my head - it's so crap."

AL: "I can appreciate that people coming back from their hols bought it, but I find it difficult to believe it's sold so many copies." What remixes did you turn down this year?

AL: "Surprisingly enough we did turn one down. We were given Walking On Sunshine by Katrina And The Waves. We thought about it long and hard, but we did turn it down."

GP: "Take That and Lulu - the Take That song was really good, but the Lulu one was terrible. I don't want to get myself dug into a hole like Brothers in Rhythm seem to have done where you just get offered pop stuff. I've done a lot of remixes this year, but I've tried to stick to the good housey garage stuff."

What was the worst club you went to this year, and were you paid to go?

GP: "I wouldn't like to say because it would upset the people who were there and had a really good night."

AL: "I'll say, I'm not ashamed. Mark and I played at this club in Southampton and it was an atrocious night. We went to the aftergig party and the promoters were really friendly so we told them that because they couldn't afford to pay us we'd accept petrol money instead. They agreed, went downstairs to sort out the money and buggered off, so we had to stay in this house with a bunch of strangers we didn't even know. In the morning we phoned up the agents to get their number, but the message on their machine said, "fuck off". I was really pissed by now because I had also found out that they'd nicked a couple of records off me in the club. We got their address, went round there and banged on the door. Their car was there so we knew they were in, so I put a breeze block through the window. I'm not ashamed of that because it made me feel a lot better. They were cunts!"

What was the best club you went to this year and were you paid to go?

MC: "Cultural Vibes in Plymouth and me own night, Good Times, in Cheltenham. I pay myself to be there."

GP: "It's got to be the Hacienda on a Saturday night. That's why I've been resident there for over six years."

AL: "Manumission at KU in Ibiza and unfortunately, no, I didn't get paid to go."

What was your tune of 94?

GP: "I've been playing a lot of my own remixes this year, but apart

from them the one I've played most would have to be that Sean Christopher one, Make My Love is it called? AL: "I think I'll have to come back to that one."

MC: "The Pizzaman record is still large now, that would have to be one of my choices. There's another as well - I can't tell you what it's called off the top of my head, but I can tell you what the sleeve looks like." (This surely has to be a positive sign that this group of jocks can't rattle off titles and artists like serious trainspotter.)

Did you cook any of the recipes from the Sainsburys' ads?

AL: "Me, I'm the worst cook in the world so I couldn't even attempt one if I wanted to."

GP: "No because my hobby is cooking and I can do much better than that."

MC: "I did actually. I did the pasta dish and it was really good. I recommend it to all my friends.

Do you know anyone who enjoyed a clean E this year?

GP: "Apparently the quality of Ecstasy improved this year in Manchester. Apparently there's been some good stuff about in Manchester for a change.

AL: "It's hard to tell if the quality of E has deteriorated over the years when you've built such a massive resistance to it - as people tell me they have you understand. There have been some good ones, particularly a Dutch gentleman in Ibiza.

What was your sporting highlight of 1994?

MC: "I'm quite partial to a bit a cricket myself, so England this summer was a highlight of sorts."

GP: "Scotland beat the Faro Isles 5 - 1."

AL: "I know Mark would have said the double for United, but that's bollocks really.

GP: "Bulgaria in the World Cup also has to be up there. I like a bit of a bet so I put £50 on Bulgaria to win the World Cup at 100 to 1. I lost, but having money riding on the game made it the most exciting football match I've seen for a long time. Come on you reds - fucking brilliant."

Have large groups of screaming girls chased you down the street and has anyone asked you for your autograph this year?

GP: "No screaming girls, it's all spotty seventeen year old blokes. Embarrassingly someone did ask me for my autograph. I just

laughed and asked him why, but I still did it.

AL: "I did tell them the autograph was no good and that all I did was play other people's records, but they did insist. As for the screaming girls; I've been chased by angry mobs down the street, which is close isn't

What was you favourite album release of 1994?

MC: "The Cafe Del Mar compilation was a real highlight."

AL: "Yeah, the Cafe Del Mar Album and Oasis."

GP: "Stone Temple Pilots." **Record Label of the year?**

AL: "Cleveland City deserved a nomination in last years' dance awards for best new label, which they didn't get. They've come a long way in such a short time."

MC: "Fantastic as far as the UK goes. Deconstruction have been really solid for a major set-up as well."

GP: "Seeing as most of the stuff I get is American white label and I'm not a trainspotter then I don't really care to be honest."

What was the worst case of music media hype in 1994?

GP: "Jungle because the records just don't come out."

AL: "Nu Energy takes the latest piss doesn't it?" Have you worked with Kylie this year and would

GP: "No, but I have had a night out with her sister; I don't like to talk about it though."

AL: "If producing her meant I could get her into a sound booth then I'd like to work with her."

Who will be the next soap star to be signed to a major label?

MC: "Beth from Brookside will do a swing beat cover." GP: "Deirdre Barlow's new boyfriend and he'll release a jungle Moroccan dark garage track with techno undertones."

AL: "Babs is joining Eastenders and I hear she's due to put together a single deal."

Snoop Doggy Dogg did it Doggystyle, but how PC were you in 94?

GP: "Political Correctness is a load of bollocks because you should always think about how you address people and what words are offensive. Consciousness is important, but the chattering classes have just chattered this one to death."

AL: "My parents are very enthusiastic about what I do, especially after they bought the first CD with my name on. They showed all the family and keep on pestering me for free meals now that they think I've got money to treat them in their old age."

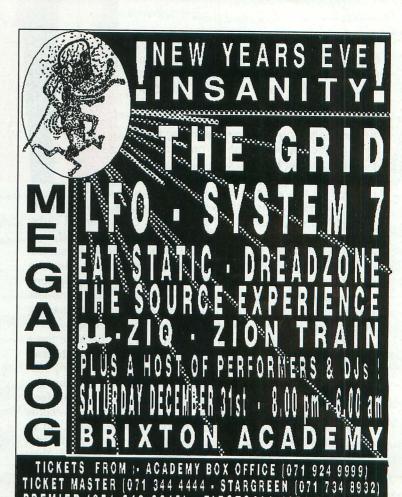

Christmas just wouldn't be Christmas without a 'Blue Peter Special Appeal' would it?
And this Christmas is no exception.
Only instead of Diane, Tim and Anthea,

beseeching all and sundry to chip in with granny's treasured hoard of milk-bottle tops to enable the purchase of those new and much needed lifeboats,

it's DJ, producer, remixer and all-round charmer Blu Peter who's been issued with all the appeal, riding the crest of a newly rolling wave, blissfully cascading with a new sound from Tipperary to Tokyo and in the process leaving looks of intense satisfaction splashed across a million e-boats.

It's been his year really, one that's seen him within the space of twelve solitary calendar months - bring out a contender for best tune, contribute to one of the most happening compilations and effortlessly continue to define and explore the ever-expanding frontiers of the music industry's most recent pigeon-hole - Nu-Energy.

Way back in June (we were the first!), we reported on this earth-shattering new genre

and the major role that Blu Peter played as the 'Ground-breaking beat-baron extraordinaire' at London's Garage and ff clubs; the man we held responsible for the inception of this nutty, nononsense knees-up. Since then Nu-Energy has been the subject of much vigorous activity with many a bod off their inter-face tuning into and producing more of these vibrant and uplifting sounds, and at the same time fast becoming a topic of no-less rigorous debate. With our good friends at Mixmag not wasting any time in having a pop and dismissing it out of hand.

"The reason they gave us a load of stick was because there was a lot of confusion," declares a slightly defensive but festively decked-out Peter, all switched on and eager to dispel any subsequent confusion. "When Mixmag asked me to describe Nu-Energy, I was not actually asked to describe the music or the feeling it generated. I was asked to describe examples of records which could be placed within the bracket of Nu-Energy. I did so rattling off a whole list of German labels all of which I think have been pioneers in promoting Nu-Energy to this country. They made the mistake of thinking that Nu-Energy is just another form of techno, it's a long way from being just that. It's unique, it's more about the way that it generates an atmosphere, the way it's put together and the way in which it's played out."

"Nu-Energy is about the feeling gained just as much as it is about the music itself, in short - the vibe. I think Mixmag only have themselves to blame as despite our request, they didn't come down and listen to the music being played in Garage, they didn't come and check out what was happening in ff. They wrote it off as a failure of a new movement, and to be quite honest, I think they've missed the point completely. I mean, doing ten minute phone interviews with three different DJs is hardly investigative journalism, now is it?" Well no, not really.

tigative journalism, now is it?" Well no, not really.

"If they'd come along and experienced it at first hand they'd have realised that there was something really serious going on and that Nu-Energy was putting a name to the vibe, maybe as in the way Rave explained Rave. Nu-Energy is the closest you can come to a new rave movement as far as I'm concerned, it's the feeling, the ups and downs and the utter euphoria. Oh, and being able to dance mindlessly for hours on end to intelligent music," he sighs, obviously relieved that finally someone is probing him in the right manner.

Being hailed as the Godfather of Nu-Energy was always going to be a mixed blessing. On the one hand it must be nice to be acknowledged for one's contribution to dancefloor excitement, but then on the other you will always have the jealous knockers



and bitter whingers lining up to point the bitchy finger of lak. Flak, Peter is only too proud to stand up to: "Fuck it! You know I'd still be playing this music whatever it was called, name or name, the music is the important thing. I love the music, I what I do and that is enough for me. The name is just there to let the people outside of the music industry know exactly what

they are listening to." Yeah, pre-

cisely.

The term is needed to differentiate from the various other styles that predominate along Techno Strasse, the Weatherall/Emmerson strand, or the Jeff Mills/Daz Saund variant amongst many others. The thing you have to understand is that we've evolved into a nation of different tribes all choosing our own favourite ways of living and the music we listen to." And contrary to what some might think, when you do partake of this tribe's particular food of life, cheese isn't on the menu!

"This music which we're talking about is techno at it's best and it's not in the slightest bit cheesey, it's actually hard music and it's getting harder by the minute. Obviously styles are changing, when we first talked to Generator back in June, there were a lot of piano riffs being used, they're now being replaced with more

bassy keyboard sounds and a lot more acid, I suppose you could say that it's getting a bit darker. That's not to say that it's not uplifting anymore, there are still strings and hands in the air breaks but the most important thing is that it's still got the ener-

gy, it will always have the energy."

It might all sound that it is becoming more intense, but it's all happened rather quickly for this boy originally from Neath Is South Wales. Just over eighteen months ago he was the one side of the bar at Heaven, choosing to serve beer over beats, started working at Heaven back in 1987, 'cause I figured that if wanted to listen to music all the time, then that would be place to do it, and the music was starting to get really good around then. It was really exciting, especially with the Summer of Love, meeting and talking to all the DJs; probably being a real pain in the arse, but I'd spend ages chatting to people like Colin Faver, Daz Saund and Trevor Fung, I used to spend a good hou after the club finished just talking with them. I was a real trainspotter!"

And now the situation's reversed, come to the DJ booth after any of his gigs and there they all are, with pad at the ready and pencil poised, their dripping anoraks sticking to their backs. "I'm a really hard person to get through to, but you can get through to me with music, because I love it so passionately, and where people come up to me after a set, asking about what I was paying I understand that and I respect it, because I'm like that too That was me a couple of years ago and they could be doing my job in a few years from now. Which is how it should be really."

It wasn't really a surprise to discover that even Japan, where Peter toured recently, isn't free of the spotter! "They love it out there. It's brilliant, they're all so enthusiastic. And it's really weird,

because with all their advanced technology, the biggest craze out there is to buy decks and demand for vinyl is really on the increase." A fact which can be supported by any of the few vinyl selling shops out in Japan.

He was preceded to Tokyo and Kyoto not only by a growing reputation, but also by his two Elevator releases, the first of

which 'Shinny' was one of the more rousing moments of last year.[And which was so named after a Japanese friend of his.] The '2nd Movement' followed as the equally uplifting and well-received second release, but then just as it looked like they were about to become acquainted with Mr. Johnny Chartpants, collaboration with erstwhile band member and co-producer Kevin White came

to a premature end.

What happened? Was it the that hoary old chestnut 'Musical differences'?

big project, I won't deny that, with the possibility one day of breaking into the top 40. I saw that myself. However, did I really want to be a part of something that was potentially top 40? No, I bloody didn't!"

Having established that he's not looking for chart success, just what is he looking for?

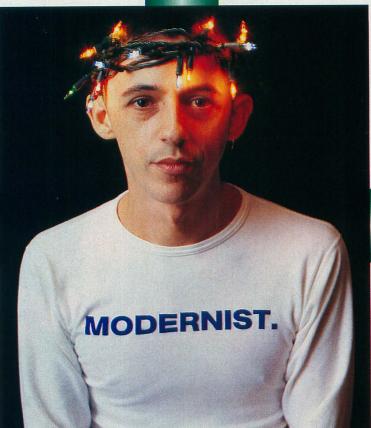
"I just want to make music, which in a selfish way is my

music. I just want to make tough, underground tunes basically and although 'Shinny' was a top tune, and a lot of people loved that record, and I love it myself, it was a hard thing to follow. 2nd Movement was me trying just that bit too hard. Whereas when we did a couple of remixes [Quench's 'Hope' and a cover of errm, 'Crazy Horses' both due out any millisecond now, and what was that about fromage?] after that we showed a lot more progression from the style. Our ideas were different and it worked out for the better."

Being energetic, enthusiastic thing that he is, he hasn't been sitting around all day on his laurels. No, he's just been into Checi's studio with Ben Tisdall of R.M.S, and Trigger and Rizzo, the resultant session being released as 'Higher Energy' by Flagship. (And it's rather large, I can assure you!) Though this is just a one off project before he embarks shortly to his beloved Germany to work with some of his heroes like Jens Lissat of 'Loo ps and Tings' fame from Hamburg and Ramon Zenker from Hamburg and No Respect records.

s he a musical creature by nature or does he pass his ideas through an engineer? "I am musical because I studied piano while I was at school, so I've always understood the structure of music. I have a feeling inside about what sounds good and what sounds wrong. Not what sounds bad, but what sounds wrong. So I'm really glad I had that training many years ago, because it's certainly come to use now, especially when making tracks myself."

Although Peter is quick to admit that: "I haven't quite mastered programming the computer yet, but I always like to make sure that I play the tunes myself and make them up when I'm in the studio; because that's one thing I think is really important,

the musical content has got to be something that I've created if it's my track. I don't want someone else doing it for me. I'm into it basically. Down to every fine detail."

Hands up any obsessives in the place? He takes his turntable duties just as seriously. "I never, ever, DJ when I'm pissed, I only did that once a long time ago at ff, and it was a complete disaster. Never again." He diligently starts preparing his set during the middle of the week, checking through his new tunes, mixing and matching them to his current faves. He is religiously obsessive and obviously deeply committed.

"I know a lot of people can DJ off their face, but I can't, I have to do it sober. I play much better sober. Though having a puff while working through my set at home really does open the music up." And who are we to disagree? But don't bloody disturb him or woe betide you, you with yer bloody interruptions!!!

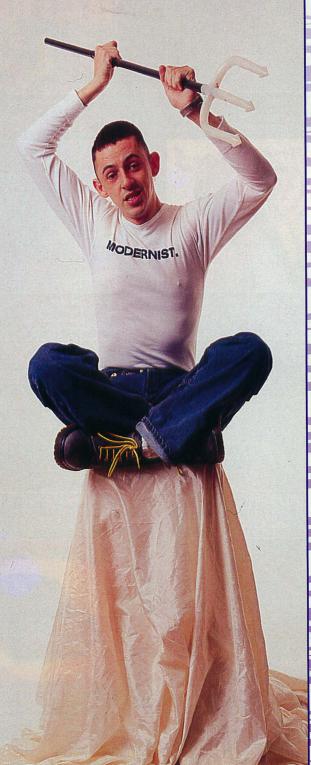
'Oh...it really winds me up, people coming and talking to me during my set, it makes me really annoyed. I'm working you know," he says with mock exasperation. "Can't they see that I'm concentrating, listening to two records at the same time (is that how they do it?)." And you're probably thinking two records ahead of those two as well? "Exactly! But I always try to hide the fact I'm annoyed. People come up and touch me. They give me this tap on the really light shoulder...aaagh!"

When did he start getting into house music, I ponder? "Around about early '86. I was buying house records on import, because I'd got bored with Hi-NRG, it was becoming too tacky. I was clubbing a lot at that time, I always liked going to clubs gay clubs that is, that was all I really knew. That was when gay people were gay and straight people were straight, unlike today where everybody is mixed."

Despite having made his name and reputation on the gay circuit, Blu Peter is quite keen to crack the straight club scene, why? "It's not that I don't like playing in gay clubs, God forbid! It's just that there aren't enough of them, there are a lot more straight clubs." And although Peter is somewhat of an icon on the gay scene, he doesn't feel that his sexuality is anybody's business but

his own. "I'm quite open about my sexuality, but it's not a feature as far as I'm concerned. My private life is my private life. I play good music and that is where it ends. If you go to a club where I'm playing, what you're getting, you're getting me, not my boyfriend, you're getting the music and that's it."

As I take my leave, I ask him if he ever watches Blue Peter? "Yes, sometimes, but you know what's really weird? I have people come up to the DJ booth and actually give me Blue Peter badges. I've been given four so far!" Which reminds me of the night at ff when he played the Mike Oldfield version of the Blue Peter theme in the middle of his set. Playing the 33rpm platter at 45rpm, as you do. Well, as he does. And it went down a storm actually. But that was strictly a one off you understand.

But if Blu Peter was Blue Peter would he have an appeal? "Yes, I'd appeal to all the magazines to stop the bitching and the fighting, accept the music for what it is, accept people for what they are, and learn to live with each other with compassion and with a greater acceptance. I'd appeal for peace in Bosnia and anywhere else there is violence in the world. Anyway one thing's for sure, Blu Peter's appeal will continue to grow and grow. Watch this space and watch that boy go. Ooh God...I think Shep agrees too. Down, Shep, down!...Shep? Get Muff Fitzgerald Some of that Nu Energy type music that he goes on about will shortly be surfacing on the tenth Reactivate album which once again the modest modernist will be mixing together in his own inimitable, flamboyant fashion. Meanwhile you can catch Blu Peter every Friday at Garage, or on Christmas Day at ff.

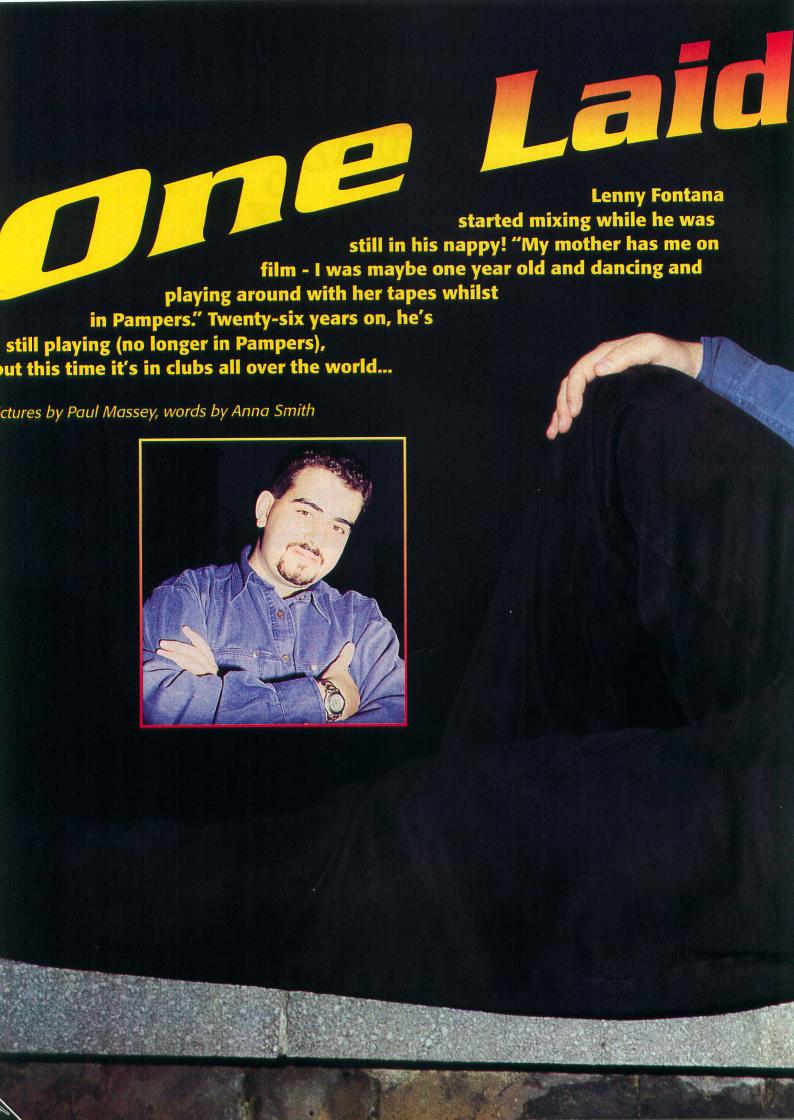

hen the whole crowd raise their hands all at the same time - that's what I play for! It's like taking a drug! It's a high! I live for that! I live for the intensity!"

Lenny is also a producer and remixer, one half of New York's Down Under Productions, the team responsible for tracks such as 'Place Called Heaven', 'Good Times Remix '94', and 'Got to Feel Good'. He has just made one of his regular visits to the UK, where he says he finds 'a more clued-up crowd.'

"The English are a lot better educated dance-wise. In the States, nobody gives a crap about what we do, we're producers, big deal. Here, producers and DJs are taken like artists. We're

doing art and we're taken for real."

Lenny says he draws from the British sound, which is a little bit less soulful. "Back home in America we write very R&B orientated songs. The English write songs that are very 'hooky', short verses, more hook. We write songs where it's big verse, bridge, chorus and so on. More orchestration."

He describes his own sound as international. "It can be played anywhere. It's a mixture of retro-70s, aggressive, hard progres-

sive sound and anthemy-type chorus."

Lenny began working as a DJ in his teens near his New York home. "I started doing mobile work, I did college parties. I used to help some of the top DJs back in the mid 80s. That gave me the start of learning how to edit. I used to hang out at Paradise Garage and eventually I got a shot at playing in New York City. Then before I knew it, I was playing the whole circuit."

Visits to Europe followed, a major move in Lenny's career. "I went from one kind of lifestyle to another almost overnight. One minute I worked in New York - then I was international."

Becoming a producer was a natural step for him. "I have classical piano playing behind me - knowing how to play helped me to sit down and produce things. When the industry was changing in New York, there weren't as many clubs to play at, so I found myself having to do something else. It's better than taking a day job."

In fact, Lenny chucked in a Wall Street job for a career in music. "I was in the financial brokerage business for a while and I said to myself, 'I can't do it - I want to do something that makes me use my imagination, my creativity.' I became a producer for

love of music."

Although Lenny admits that DJing and producing often go hand in hand, not everybody can do both, he says. "Everybody who's anybody in the production business is a DJ - but the question is how good they are. You put them in front of a crowd, could they handle it? They could be excellent in the studio but they could stink behind the turntables."

Clearly Lenny feels he's got what it takes. "You've got to know how to pick music, you have to foresee a hit in your head.

Something you're going to play and the crowd's going to go wild."

To Lenny, his audience's reaction is everything. "People coming to dance are going to buy my records, so the music I'm doing is mostly for them. It's not for me. It's not for my ego. I do it for the people and they respect me and I love it."

He sees mixing with the crowd as part of his job. "When I go out with people from the company, they don't want me to talk to people. I tell them, 'No, let them come near the booth.' I'm part of them. I want them to shake my hand, I want them to dance with me. We're here to party, to have a great time."

"Sometimes the DJ booth is like a sanctuary where you can't do anything," he says. "That's not for me. I want people to know who I am and appreciate me. They want you back. You're com-

fortable, nice, you're great."

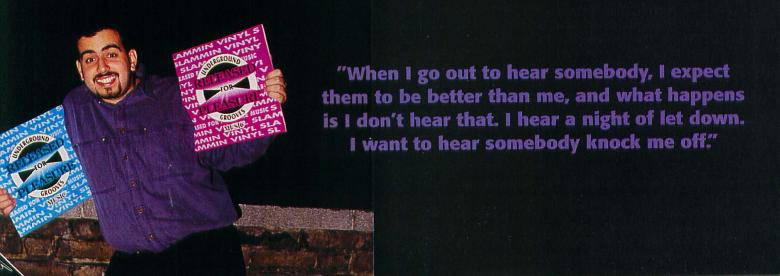
According to Lenny, his performance is virtually unrivalled. "When I go out to hear somebody, I expect them to be better than me, and what happens is I don't hear that. I hear a night of let down. I want to hear somebody knock me off. But I don't get to hear a night that makes me say, 'wow, you kicked my ass.' You just watch the crowd, they're not reacting. There's a difference between dancing and screaming and hollering."

So do they always, without fail, scream and holler for Lenny? Apparently so. "I've walked into rooms blind, without knowing what the room was like, and turned the room out. As soon as I get the first scream, I know. As soon as the first record drops and they go wild, it makes me excited. I bring the crowd so... up."

With all this adoration, does he find himself an object of female desire? This question is met first with embarrassment and then emphatic denial. "No! No, no, no, no, no!" he shouts. "No my wife - I don't lead people on. I will talk to them, just like I'm having a discussion with you, and I won't lead you on." (I'm devastated).

"I'm not in this industry for that reason. I have a woman that believes in me, which is very important. I talk with her about my work. She's got a good ear for knowing what's good and what's not. She can't sit down and write lyrics - I wish she could sometimes, it'd be a lot easier! It's like, behind every great man there's an even greater woman. She supports me one hundred per cent which to me, is worth more than all the shit I'm dealing with in this business."

'Some of this shit,' he says, is the competitiveness of the industry. "You're on top playing for a little while, consistently,



when all of a sudden, some guy creates a hit record and you're not wanted anymore. It's tough to make it. You don't have a name and that's what they want."

Big names may be big business, but this isn't how Lenny works. "DJs are supporting each other. I'm noticing that producers play only their own stuff, they won't touch anybody else's stuff unless it really breaks big. But if I find I like it, even if it's from a complete nobody, just a first record, if it's slamming, I'm going to play it. There's no way I'm going to ignore it just because I don't know the guy. I'm going to play it because the guy did something that's worth playing."

In order to discover these unknown gems, Lenny spends hours in record shops checking everything out. "When I go to a record shop, I'm there three or four hours. It's a job. It's a pain in the ass sometimes, but I'll listen to everything, sometimes twice. I have to feel assured, after all I am spending money to buy it."

Lenny is working hard to make his own name known. "I'm an eager self-proprietor. I have my own business, I want to see it do well. I taste it, I want it. I want to prove it to myself that I can make it big. But I'm waiting patiently."

"You have to work at it. I'm aggressive, spontaneous, pushy, nice...it's part of the business. You've got to be humble, but aggressive."

Lenny admits that he is using Britain as a test bed for his music. "The dance market in England is very big. I'm using England as my back door to America. America's looking at the English market as a point to judge its success. If it's what I have to do to get American records signed, I'm going to use my English friends."

He has shrewdly sussed the novelty value of his nationality. "I wouldn't live here, you would lose that American edge about me. The English public loves the idea of the Yanks coming over to play records. If I come to live over here, I'll just be another American-English DJ."

I am assured that Lenny is not just using us, by the fact that his favourite night out of 1994 was the After Eight Party. "I put the first record on, the crowd just opened up and I left the DJ booth and headed straight for the dance floor. They went bananas, 'cos I showed them, I'm just like you. I go out too. They loved it, they ate that up."

Does he not think this response might ever be due more to narcotics? "You don't know how many people are straight and how many are high. But the scene is very drug-influenced."

Our Lenny, however, is as clean as can be. "I'm not one for drugs. I've seen too many people get hurt on it and get hooked. It becomes part of your life, it goes beyond the club and into your personal life. You can lose everything."

Music is enough for him. "I don't need drugs to get me going. I can get excited from hearing a record right now. Certain records do that to you."

As he tells me about the music of his favourite DJ, greatest influence and good friend Kenny Carpenter, it is clear that this guy doesn't need drugs to get swept away by it all.

"I love what Kenny does," he enthuses. "I go to his dance floors and I cry to his music. Some records, you feel it and you have goose bumps, I can just feel it now as I'm talking to you about it. I can just imagine the way he plays records." And he really does have tears in his eyes.

But happy tunes may soon be a thing of the past, says Lenny. The future is hard. "I think music is going to change. I think we're getting out of this happy time now into a harder sound. Music is getting more aggressive."

And as trends changes, so must he. "I'm always changing my sound. I want to be different, I don't want people to say, 'Oh, it's that same piano, the same bassline.' I want, 'Oh, Lenny did that too? Interesting!"

Maintaining popularity as a DJ isn't easy, so Lenny's long-term plan is to make it as a producer. "It's very easy to be forgotten tomorrow as a DJ. But if you're a world-renowned producer, you can work with Frank Sinatra, you can work with anybody. You're not setting boundaries for yourself."

His success, of course, depends upon the public. "If it happens, let it happen through the crowd. Let them do it for me. I'm very humble. It's nice to think of being a superstar, but let them create it. If that's the way you see me, beautiful."

I have a suspicion that's also the way he sees himself.
"I'm an excellent DJ. I know some day I'm going to hit it big. I'm a talented kinda guy."

From pop music to the most respected deep Chicago house, Tim Barr gets Messrs Farley and Heller to open up...

"The whole vocal house thing has become a bit of a cliche in this country," says Pete Heller. "It's become very boring, in as much as it's been latched onto by the major labels who've turned it into something very dull." It's not exactly the kind of thing you'd expect to hear from one of London's most respected house enthusiasts. But, ever since they hooked up together

at Danny Rampling's semi-legendary Shoom Club, Pete Heller and Terry Farley have forged themselves something of a reputation as mavericks in an industry which, on the whole, would really rather prefer its celebrities to toe the party-line.

Back then, of course, house music was still too underground to attract the attention of corporate raiders interested only in raping the new form for every last drop of its commercial appeal. At that time, Pete Heller had just returned to London from Manchester, after completing a degree in Physics, and Farley, a former gas-fitter, was working with Andy Weatherall on a Boca Juniors track. "We knew Pete from working in clubs," explains Terry, in his usual, affable manner. "He was fairly musical - he knew how to work a drum machine! So we got him to come along. As it happened, our tastes were much more compatible so we took it from there really."

After working on a Primal Scream remix together, the pair began a successful association which has proved to be one of the most enduring partnerships in the fast-moving, and often capricious, world of the British dance scene. Their own musical projects, both as Fire Island and Roach Motel, have delivered some of the finest moments to appear from this country's fixation with all things American. In addition, a burgeoning remix career has seen their talents applied to a wide variety of acts. Perhaps their most controversial decision, however, was to brave the slings and arrows of public opinion by joining the likes of Brothers in Rhythm in the producer's chair for Kylie Minogue's recent long-form offering.

"We've come in for a little bit of stick for that," says Terry, regretfully. "But it was an opportunity for us to make a pop record. We didn't make house records with Kylie Minogue. What we tried to do was to make as good a pop record as we could, using our style. We didn't make the Kylie record for ourselves, or any of the people we know, to play. I don't think we would have done a mix for her, but the chance of producing her was something different. It gave us the opportunity to see if we could make a pop record. And that's what we did. I think we did it successfully. But, I'm prepared to stand up and support what we did. Definitely. It's equally as soulful as, say, M-People and no one



would criticise us for producing them. It was a pop venture and if we'd come back with some sort of Underground, Junior Vasquez-style Sound Factory record, the record company would just have said "What's this? - We don't want this. It's going on an album to sell to 14 year old kids! So it was our attempt at making a pop record, nothing else."

"No one was asking us to resurrect something really dodgy," adds Pete. It'd have been different if it had been some sort of tired old rock star who'd been around for years. But, I don't know that Kylie Minogue is any less of a dance artist than anyone else. She has a certain credibility. Personally, I wouldn't do a Rolling Stones remix, but production is different anyway. You've got the opportunity to start from scratch."

"There ends the case for the defence," laughs Terry. "And we're sticking with it!"

The team get the chance to display their mixing skills to a wider audience this month, with the release of their 'DJ Power' outing on Rumour Records' subsidiary, Escapade. Or at least, Pete does...

"Pete mixed it," explains Terry. "At the end of the day, he's a better mixer than me, so it took him half the time to do it that it'd have taken me ... and, also, Pete's got the DAI machine at

his house! So it made sense. I picked the records and he mixed them it was a fair division of labour!"

And a neat choice too. From the opening grooves of 'Voices', the set runs through a selection of the very best house and garage cuts of recent months, from Joi Cardwell's delirious 'Trouble' and the straight-edged minimalism of 95 North's superb 'Hold On' to Felix Da Housecat's upfront 'In The Dark' and Danny Tenaglia's classic 'Bottom Heavy'. It's an excellent collection which highlights the fact that house music can still be intense, edgy and brilliant. But, with British tracks heavily outnumbered by their American counterparts, it seems as though Farley and Heller have a problem with house music being made on these shores.

"Not at all," replies Pete. "We judge any record on its merits. Me and Terry started off as should DJs and that's a lot of where

our sort of vibe comes from. So we've always, naturally, looked over to the States for that. They've got a bit more of that in the music for some reason. I would say, on the whole, that I don't get sent a lot of good music from this country. Maybe it's just historical, we haven't been doing it as long as they have over there. I think production values tend to be lower here. People tend to go into any old studio and bang out a track whereas, in the States, that would never do because they're much more concerned about the sound of the record. At the end of the day, they've got very good sound systems in most of the clubs over there, and they know exactly how it's going to sound on the dancefloor. Over here, most clubs have fairly average systems so it tends not to be such an important consideration. A lot of the time, I get tracks with really good ideas but the pro-

duction is just not good enough to play out. But most records I get sent are absolutely appalling - just really tinny, badly-made records and 'I think, if they can't be bothered to make sure the record's right then why should I bother to listen to it properly."

"I think that there's nothing wrong with certain British house music," adds Terry. "There's a track on the 'DJ Power' album by Scott and Scooby from Newcastle, there's one on there from Ashley, there's the Hustlers Convention track and there's one of ours which the record company insisted on having. But I don't think there's anything intrinsically wrong with British house - it's just that what's actually happened is that people's definition of house music has widened. My definition of house music is that it must have a link with black Chicago, circa 1985. There are loads of records which keep those kind of roots but, nowadays, people seem to think that anything with a 4/4 beat is house music. They bring up cheesy old Euro records, like Tinman and stuff, when really, that's got nothing to do with house music - it's some sort of bastard form of dance music that you either like or you don't. So, you know, there's nothing wrong with British house music, it's just there are loads of records masquerading under the wrong title."

"House music comes from disco, which is obviously a black

form of music, and, although you don't have to be black to make that music, I think a love of it should come through in what you do. The majority of British house records are, to my mind, not house records - they've just got a house beat. There's a big difference between house records and records with a house beat. 'live Bunny' has a house beat, but it's not a house record!"

"At the moment, there's a good network of people on the house scene. People like Harri at The Sub Club, Elliot and Miles at Hard Times, Scott and Scooby in Newcastle, the guys at Middlesborough Arena, all playing good, black-tinged American house music. There are these little outposts of people who aren't giving in to the Mixmag conspiracy of cheesy old records. I think that cheesy thing will outwear itself in the end, already tacky cowboy records are out of fashion and soon, they'll have done hillbilly house and whatever and they'll have nothing left to do.

In the end the good records will still be thee."

Kenny 'Dope' Gonzales recently commented that the whole house scene had become stagnant. Isn't there a sense in which, if house music has to keep its roots in mid-Eighties Chicago, it has an inbuilt inability to progress and develop, in the same way that techno has an implicit need to go forward and be different every time?

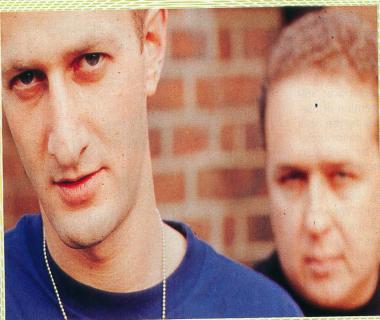
"I don't know," considers Terry. "One of my favourite producers is Roy Davis Jnr, and, to me, that new 'Wildlife E.P.' is just out there. It's really cutting edge. I'd imagine that Orde and Stuart are playing that, but it still sounds black, it sounds American. Personally, at the moment, I'm not a great lover of classic New house music, Jersey-type which most people would think of as black American house music. I think that is

very stagnant. But you've got Felix Da Housecat, Roy Davies, you've got people like Chez Damier and Ron Trent. Their records, I think, are progressing and they're not stagnant but they do still sound like they're the real deal."

"I think you just have to look at the exciting things that are happening on the instrumental side of things," says Pete. "I got a couple of DJ Pierre records that came out recently and, there's nothing new or different about them, on the face of it. It's just DJ Pierre doing his thing. But they're brilliant, they really work well and they're very exciting. The way he's put together all the same old elements is just so powerful. It's the ability of this music to move me and make me want to play it and see people go mad to it - just the way you can bring up a whole crowd by putting the needle on at the beginning of the record and letting it play. I know there's a lot of power in this music, and it's not really to do with direction or going forward - it's just well-made music."

"If you define house music as something that has its roots in black America," concludes Terry, "I think it can be made by a white kid in Newcastle or a black guy in Detroit, as long as it keps its roots. I don't think that house music has to be confined - as long as it retains those roots and that vibe, it can go anywhere. There's no limit to it."

"We didn't make house records with Kylie Minogue. What we tried to do was to make as good a pop record as we could, using our style."

"HOUSE NATION 2 - ESSENTIAL CLASSIC HOUSE HITS" (REACT MUSIC)

It only seems like yesterday that I was listening to House Nation I, thinking to myself, 'this is a damn good album', or words to that effect. Actually, it was yesterday, and now I'm listening to volume 2. These React people don't hang about! It seems that Volume I was universally liked, and with this in mind, House Nation 2 has been 'rush released' to satisfy demand. With a best of/classics series such as this, it is inevitable that no. 1 will always be the best - how many classics can there be after all? However despite my theory, House Nation 2 is a winner. The tracks chosen are varied, as with Volume 1, and there are a few surprises here too. By this I mean that there are tracks which I had forgotten all about, but once heard again, it all comes floating back. Mr Fingers 'Can You Feel It', Reese & Santonio's "Rock To The Beat' and Phuture's 'Acid Trax' are three such tracks. Obvious choices include Frankie Knuckles' finest moment 'Your Love', Todd Terry's 'Bango' and the much (too much) sampled 'I Need Somebody' by Kechia Jenkins. The Jungle Brothers' ground-breaking 'I'll House You' is here, as is the also-classic 'Work It To The Bone' by LNR.

The last word goes to Lil Louis 'French Kiss', possibly the most risqué record to have been played on Radio 1 and the like in years. Oh, and did I forget to mention that it's another classic? What else... 9/10

"A MAN, A VAN, A BLEEPER" (SLIP N SLIDE)

The first thing to say about this album is that it is not just a compilation, but a round-up of highlights from the influential underground label, 'E Legal Recordings'.

E Legal have been around for some five years now, and have avoided flooding the record buying public with release after release just to keep the name alive. Instead they release a record when it's worth it. As the press info says, 'quality not quantity'. The policy does work though. I have very few E Legal twelves, but those I do have successfully avoided landing in the

chuck-out pile on one of my regular record-shedding exercises.

This collection has a slightly 'dated' sound to it, but I do not mean this in any derogatory way; quite the opposite in fact. I am more than a little fed-up with some of the cheesier offerings around at the moment, and this album is a welcome change. For example, five years old, and still requested, is Todd Terry's mix of 'Brass Disk' by Dupree, the vocal line of which was sampled and taken into top 40 territory by Bizarre Inc in 'I'm Gonna Get You'. Hip House before anyone even thought of a '94 revival. There are several tracks by E Legal favourites the Gypsymen, and all produced by Todd Terry which is alright by me. 'Stoppin Us' by the aforementioned is, or rather was, a dub mix of Margaret Conway's 'Sure Shot', but it was considered good enough and far enough away from the original to call it a track in its own right. 'Daylite' by the Gypsymen was a reflection on Gypsy Woman by Crystal Waters back in 1991, and is another Fire Todd Terry mix. Last mention goes to the excellent 'Jungle Kisses' by Roc & Kato, which featured recently on the Journeys By DJ series (Paul Oakenfold), and had me asking questions as to where this genre came from. Now I know and so do you. 8/10

"GROOVERIDER HARDSTEP SELEC-TION 1" KICKIN RECORDS

Grooverider selection. That's it nuff said, end of review, 'cos you know exactly what you're gonna get. Put at its simplest, if you like your Jungle/Drum & Bass, you'll get along fine with this collection.

I shan't waste time giving you the low-down on Grooverider, as that would be like asking Mark Thatcher if he knew the King of Saudi Arabia, or asking Ranulph Fiennes if he knows about getting a chapped knob. (Wind-chapped, that is). What I can say is that there are 16 of the strongest jungle tracks to be found on this album (tape version mixed by Grooverider, separate tracks on CD + vinyl) including contributions from such labels as Formation, 3rd Party, Prototype (Groovender's label), Metalheads and of course, Kicking Records. Artists themselves then - Tom & Jerry, and they appear twice with

'Dance' (well thought out title) and 'Maximum Style' (better title), LJC Bukem's 'Music' (Jesus, someone buy a thesaurus), and the extraprolific, 'DJ Slipmatt with 'Breakin Free'. Buckwild's 'Silent Voice' comes as close as a jungle track can to being a cover version, this being a 'cover' of the Innocence track, also entitled 'Silent Voice'. The Kickin offering is from the Noodles & Wonder duo, who had the excellent 'Dub Soup' EP out a few months back, and the track chosen here is 'Magic'. (I was right about the thesaurus). I must say that I would have liked to hear the mixed version of this LP, but as it stands, the tracks are all top notch, and we can safely assume that the mix tape will match it easily. 8/10

"HH COMP IV" (WEA RECORDS)

Now, I may have this album's title wrong, but here's the scenario - I have no press release and no contact number, and don't really want to go through WEA's switchboard to find an elusive person whose name I don't have to find out the info I need! I very much suspect that the above title is an abbreviation for Harthouse Compilation 4, judging by the artists on here. No money's going on it though.

What I can tell you is that it should

already have been released as you read this, and if you have a fancy for all things German (Claudia Schiffer/Helmut Kohl, delete as applicable), then you should have a hunt around for this, even if you don't know the exact title! Ten tracks make up this album, but those ten tracks have been recorded on a C120 tape for promotional purposes - yes, they're long and large. Spicelab are first on this LP with 'PyreSpice', doing what they do best with more hi hats than you shake a shitty stick at. Patrick Lindsey shares with us his 'Torment', which involves bad flatulence I guess. If all those bubbling farting acidic synths are to be believed. Pulse go one further than their usual 'minimalistic' approach, but still keep things simple (and tight). Resi D's 'Skyline' is darker territory, minors everywhere, and

seemingly a gloomy skyline from their studio window, until etc.

award, but not for the track title

which is 'Acid Vol 3', obviously lowgrade acid, but wicked all the same. Let's just get to the point though -Hardfloor and 'Fish & Chips'. I eagerly skip through to get to this track, and yay, I am impressed much as I thought I would be. Okay, their tracks all sound like remixes of 'Acperience' (Yes, correct spelling), but that's no bad thing, 'cos they're all going to be good. I couldn't be bothered to listen to the last track as I've already made up my mind. 10/10

VARIOUS ARTISTS

"DJ POWER VOL 2" (ESCAPADE RECORDS)

Following Vol 1 which was mixed by Danny Rampling comes the Farley & Heller team on the mix, and on Volume 2 we are served a plateful of some of the bounciest garage and house tracks around. Swingy hi-hats and daps are the order of the day!

Farley & Heller (Terry & Pete, sounds like a couple of pub singers that) are known as the backbone of the Boys Own 'Movement'. I say movement, as simply a label it is not! Also responsible for Roach Motel and Fire Island, and occasionally caught on tape, in the mix. Escapade have managed to do just

As I have mentioned, the album features plenty of garage cuts, starting with 'Voices In My Mind' by Voices and the geetar-twanging 'Trouble' by Joi Cardwell, but there we hit the first typically Farley & Heller choice with 'Welcome To the Klub' by MD XPress, which could actually be one of their own tracks. Roach Motel features here with 'Movin' On', so it wouldn't be that unexpected. Danny Tenaglia gets 'Bottom Heavy' (nothing personal I'm sure), Hustler's Convention part with one of their many tracks, this time its the 'Hustler's Dance', whilst Felix Da Housecat is 'In the Dark', much like myself sometimes.

This reeks of swingy hi-hats, thumping bass, waistcoats, smiles, singing divas and swinging beavers. Mm, what a thought. 9/10

VARIOUS ARTISTS "TAKING LIBERTIES" (TOTEM RECORDS) This album is about as varied a compilation as you'll find, and what's more, it's in a good cause. 'Taking Liberties' is a clever title for an album whose proceeds are

going to various organisations opposing the Criminal Justice Bill. A double album full of artists all willing to donate towards the cause, and the first track on the LP sets the agenda in a nutshell.

Dreadzone's 'Fight The Power' is a dubby track, merely there as a backbone over which various relevant samples have been dropped in, the end result being that no-one can be in any doubt that these people are not HP, frankly. Orbital's 'Are We Here?' features next, followed by Test Dept. with 'Critical Frame of Mind'. Steve Hillage's System 1 offer the dreamy ambient textures of 'Depth Disco', whilst on the other side of tape I, Caustic Window show us 'Phlaps'. Fun-damental's 'Mr Bubbleman' finishes cd/Record one (told you it was varied). Back on more familiar ground (for me), the Orb expose to us the secrets of the 'Blue Room', and are followed by offerings from Trans-Global Underground (I Voyager), Ultramarine (Trace Elements), The Drum Club Club (Drums are Dangerous), and Galliano (Travels The Road). The album's high points for me are last to arrive. Firstly, the Shamen give us their new material (none since 1993) with a track called, well, 'The Shamen'. It surprises me that they took this long in recording a track with such a title! They are at their ambient best here - swhirley synths and lots of bubbling bits, I love it! The other coup is The Prodigy & P.W.E.I. with 'Their Law', taken from the Prodigy LP, 'The Jilted Generation', and no prizes for guessing what their album title refers to. Yesireebob, this was written with the C'JB in mind quite firmly. To quote P.W.E.I, 'Fuck 'em and their law'. 9/10

"THE INFINITE WHEEL

THE INFINITE WHEEL' (BRAINIAK RECORDS)

I received this album a month or so ago on tape, and didn't go much on it. Now, I listen to it again and can't help but wonder what the hell I was thinking - perhaps someone

had recorded some other shite over the tape by mistake, because this is easily one of the most stunning albums I've received in a long time.

A quick and easy comparison can be made with the likes of Deep Forest, and to a certain extent, to some of the material found on the recent Café Del Mar compilation on React. By this I mean that the samples have been put to full creative use, plundering more 'ethnic' samples than I thought possible, and stringing it all together into some wonderful dubby grooves. Eight tracks make up this album, starting with 'Lake of Dreams' (short-version) and ending with a longer version of the same track. This is good news, as I couldn't get enough of those luscious strings in the short version. 'Eleven Dimensions' is a bongos-meets-pulses affair, and reminded me in some way of an old Bomb The Bass record, 'Don't Make Me Wait', but only in its remixed form. I don't suppose that helps much though! 'Jave Dub' takes on a more ambient line, and as the name suggests, develops into a deep and dubby number. 'Enviro' starts in a similar way that 'Jave Dub' ends, but slower and with hints of reggae. 'Tantric Dub' is at its ethereal ethnic-most, and it might conceivably be called dubby. Funny that. 'Digi Out'? Erm, dub... ethnic... shit, run out of keywords. The point is though, the same thing could be said about each and every track there is kind of a theme which runs through the whole LP, and it's quality stuff. While I'm thinking dub, I'm also thinking 'The Orb', so that can also help you along the way. Incidentally, the artwork is pretty damn good too. 10/10

CHOICE TUNE ALBUMS

"AMBER" (WARP)

Autechre are from Manchester, by way of Sheffield. Their first album, 'incunabula' weaved their electro influences into a fresh new tapestry techno-era soundscapes. 'Amber' is an altogether darker outing. Opening with the bleak indus-



trialism of 'Foil', Sean Booth and Rob Brown deliver a series of edgy Detroit-styled grooves, as in 'Piezo for example, which betray an acute understanding of the conceptual engineering behind the dancefloor imperative. Strange, other-worldly loops course through the grooves of 'Amber', dislocating and fracturing the minimal melodic structures on offer. The mood is lightened by the quirky beauty of tracks like 'Slip' or 'Nine' where the electronics bend and curve into more immediately accessible shapes. All this, and the most beautiful album cover in the world (courtesy of The Designers Republic), make this release one you should be checking out sooner, rather than later.

VARIOUS ARTISTS

"AGENDA 22" (NEW ELECTRONICA) Here is a label which I cannot seem to find fault with - part of the Beechwood group which is responsible for the various different Mastercuts series, New Electronica has a knack of licensing some of the best material of this kind around. Agenda 22 is made up of tracks from the Eevo Lute label in Holland, and contains several works by Stephan Robbes who features in last month's Generator.

New Electronica don't let us down in the value for money area, as there are 13 tracks present on this compilation, not unlucky at all. I have not previously heard any of the material here, and so had a whale of a time randomly flicking around this CD to see what it could offer, and here are some of the goodies I found. 'Sea Of Tranquility' by Florence was the first random selection, and is by the aforementioned Stephan Robbers, who is also the brains behind the whole Eevo Lute shenanigan. This is a track which begins in a very ambient way, and manages to hold the

laid back vibe once the percussion kicks in. 'Cabs' by the keyprocessor is my next stop, and involves a fine wobbly bassline and lots of clicky and bleepy kraftwerk type sounds mixed with some more standard techno patterns (heavy on the hi hats, bass drum not overloaded though). David Caron has two fine tracks here, the jazzed ambience of 'A Quiet Passing' and even deeper jazz elements in 'A Fantasy on a Fantasy on a' I'm told that Mo Wax will be working with this man soon, and I can't wait. My personal favourite track is an odd choice though - 'Poem 2411' is a poem. Poetry's for saps right? In which case, I must have just come out of my tree this morning. The content is all social conscience, and how we're all fucking things up, and despite the at first offputting foreign accent, the message comes across loud and clear over the gloomy ambient back-drop. I've mentioned but a few tracks, but there are no losers here I can assure you. 9/10

VARIOUS

"OUT THERE" (PI RECORDINGS) Subtitled 'A Thread Through Time', 'Out There' is a comprehensive snapshot of the state of the electronic music scene, both past and present. With offerings from the lives of Chris & Cosey, Black Dog, Psychick Warriors or Gaia and Coil, the style is eclectic and forward-thinking. Though Twitch and Brainstorm from Edinburgh's Pure appear only once (it's their label after all), with the neat, literacy, angle of '101 Beats in Sodom', it's their presence which dominates this exclusive set with a free-thinking innovative approach that more compilers should take note of. High points? Among the twenty tracks on offer there are many, but special mention must go to 0 from Finland's superb Sahko label, with the delirious 'Atomit', and to the mysteriously-titled Karen X with 'She Is'. Forget your preconceptions and take a step into the world of Pi. You won't regret it.

CCOL hat Made 1994 Jus That Little Bit Bette releasing, it was that goldmine of tunes affectionately known as the Jazz Juice series.

It was 1985 when the first and second volumes were compiled and issued for the ears (and feet!) of the jazz/soul following. Now in 1994 we have most (some could not be used for contractual reasons) of the tracks of those wonderful tunes re-issued on one spanking new Jazz Juice collection.

Compiled originally by a young jazz DJ called Gilles Peterson (strangely not credited on the reissue!), these tracks went a long way to "opening up" jazz music in its widest sense to a large audi-

The music itself weighs in at sixteen tunes - an essential slice of the danceable side of jazz. Opening up with the rather delicious "Miles" the 1967 classic by mainman, Miles Davis, the quality continues with two great (and only ever rereleased on the Jazz Juice series) tracks in "Jeannine' and "Boss Tres Bien". The latter is a real treat, combining percussion and piano, to build into a heavy latin jazz workout. Massive!

This same vein runs through the album, especially with the two Sergio Mendes tracks "Rhoda" and the mighty "Mas Que Nada" and the wonderfully sublime "Crickets Sing For Anamaria" - a real JJ tune. There's the great vocal jazz workouts "I Bet You Thought I'd Never Find" (always a floor-filler); the scat style Dianne Schurr cover of the classic "It Don't Mean A Thing" and Pat Longo's 1979 version of "I Believe In Love".

Proceedings are brought to a close by the hard-hitting, floor-shaking poetry/rap that is "It's A Trip" by The Last Poets and powerful stuff it is indeed. Just like it was in 1985 this eclectic mix is an essential piece of music that stands the test of time and is a great intro-duction to "jazz music," which it originally was for me. For this small but nonetheless very important reason, I give thanks. P.S. Volume 2 soon, please! 10/10

MR FINGER

"LOVE" (BLACK MARKET INT.)

How Much Can You Take?

Hot on the heels of his swirling ambient soundscape collection, "Sceneries Not Songs", original Chicago house genius Mr Fingers delivers a second more soulful and

jazz-based house set titled "Back To Love".

This album showcases much of Mr Fingers aka Larry Heard's incredible talents and its deep soul and diverse vibes ensure it's another winning selection. Sample the sexy hypnotic "Never Take Your Place" alongside the current single "I Need for musical bliss. The title track drops some more serious melodies and the first side closes with the harmonies and exquisite keys of "Love Guaranteed".

The dreamy "Mystical People" opens the second side and rolls straight into the soundscape "Share My Love". On the deeper Lip, check "I Care" and the instrumental "Sweet Wine" which soars into the mind with its classic beauty. Rounding off on the upbeat vibe there's "Show Me" but for CD fans there's a treat in store with three extra tracks, "Teasing", "I've Fallen (Under A Spell)" and the instru-mental "Caress". Deeply soulful loosely based in the house vein, "Back To Love" draws on all kinds of musical styles including jazz, swing and 70's style groove and

All in all, another landmark in Mr Finger's prolific career. His inimitable style and great feeling for what he's doing will always ensure an audience and it's great to see a legend back on top. 9/10

GALLIANO

"A THICKER PLOT" (REMIX LP) (TALKIN LOUD)

I guess it's kind of ironic that one of the hardest working live Funk/Jazz bands in the country should bring out a remix album, but there really are some killer cuts on this a track LP, to make it all seem worthwhile.

All but one of the tracks are originally from the 'Plot Thickens' album, (the exception being "Skunk Funk" from 'A Joyful Noise ...'), and they've all been totally stripped down and toughened up for the dancefloor in mind.

Worth buying, if just for the 'Palm skin production' mix of "Long Time Gone" - this is rough music that will set alight any club for sure, unrecognisable from the original version. There is also the 'Roots' mix of "Believe", which is pure leftfield hip hop - just nod yer head to this one - raw drum and hazy vocals, this is bad-ass music! And if that 'aint enough, you've got the 'X

So if a little sceptical at first of the whole idea of a remix album, as generally these are done as a quick money earner at the expense of the loyal fan, I admit that this gets away with it for the fact, there are simply so many good tracks, drawing diverse influences from all facets of club culture! VARIOUS ARTISTS

"NO ENERGY VOLUME 1" (JUMPIN & PUMPIN)

Oh no, not another 'genre'. New Energy this, New Energy that. Is this really a new form of music? I think not, but the name given to this music is, if you can see the point I'm trying to make. It can only help 'n marketing through, and Jumpin & Pumpin' are already there.

Despite any misgivings I may have about the spurious new 'genre', this compilation is a good one. It kicks off with Tin Tin Out's 'The Feeling', and although it may be by Tin Tin Out featuring Sweet Tee, she certainly ain't featuring on this version, as it's a Baby Doc and the Dentist crop up twice, once with the Spanish vocal intoned 'infanta'ci' and 'Catalan Rising', one of the hardest tracks present on the album, although in close competition is Jones & Stephenson's Hardfloor-like 'The 1st Rebirth' which is apparently due for a UK release with this fanfuckingtastic new mix soon - Looks like a musthave. OCP (inspired by Robocop perhaps) offer similar hard as nails material with 'Energy Frenzy', but on a calmer note is Yum Yum's '3 minute Warning', taken from London label Sperm Records. Pleasant acidic basslines and not so in-yer-face breaks make this one positively ambient in comparison to the others. 'For Your Love' by Elevator is hard but happy and uplifting at the same time and brought to us courtesy of DJ Blu Peter. Also on this compilation are tracks by Dual Mount (?), Hiroshima and Virtualmismo. A great compilation, but as for this 'New Energy' title, it's a pile of cack.

CHRISTIAN VOGEL

"BEGINNING TO UNDERSTAND" (MILLE PLATEAUX) My first reaction when hearing this

Hardfloor Lay Down Your Pain

LP was, 'Surely he's not from Brighton'. Here is a label from Germany, which up til now, has produced some fine electronic music by some of Germany's best. This sounds equally European, but I know for a fact that everything created on this LP was produced courtesy of University of Sussex's recording facilities in Brighton. When I was at college, they had brass, woodwind and a casio portastudio, so, lucky bugger, that's what I say.

The beats found on this album vary in speed and style, but the common element is an 'industrial' feel, and often overloaded sounds give the tracks a rough edge. 'Machine' is fast industrial techno, whilst 'Sub-Aqua' is a slower bubbling (apt) piece of work, easy on the drums, but with that cleverly crafted tough edge - rough edges are not accidents or sloppy production, it must be said. Conversation' is a standard 'hi-hatsflanged-to-the-max' number with the odd hoover noise thrown in the background for good measure, whilst the title track 'Beginning To Understand' is an example of minimalistic/pulse music as good as anything that's come before.

A creditable debut from someone who really should be propping up a student bar, getting pissed, bunking off lessons and getting stoned at the Zap whenever possible. Of course, that might be exactly how this album came about. Perhaps I have knocked the proverbial nail on the head. 9/10

NEW ERA

"BEYOND GRAVITY" (RELECTIVE)

New Era are a London duo who are currently knocking out techno tracks by the bucketload. However, when I write techno, I mean it in the oldest sense, ie Detroit Techno, before Techno became what it is today. Yes, Detroit influences are here as sure as my two feet are planted on the floor, although I am tapping one foot now and then as I flick through this LP.

Comparisons will be made with anyone who was vaguely related to the Detroit Techno scene, but I rather think that some of it is reminiscent of Adamski in his 'Live & Direct' days. 'Mirror Images' and 'Proprietary Solution' slot into this description to some extent, but Adamski never used mellow pond-

'Mono Concentrate' has similar melodies, and those sublime pond sounds as well as a much calmer hi-hat approach - 'Mono Concentrate (Visual Breakout)' adds a bit more with saxaphones and a jazz organ. 'Newtons Law' is an otherwise sound track which is spoiled for me by some particularly nasty sounding cowbells which run all the way through.

'Black Hole In The Sun' is a cheery number despite its title, and more than makes up for 'Newton's Flaw', 'Rapid Eye Flicker' speeds things up and is generally more oddball, whilst final track 'Pots & Pans' is back to more conventional territory. 'Pots & Pans' aptly describes some of the percussion used here, London based, but Detroit flavoured. I'm waiting for some very interesting twelves to come out. 9/10

ETERNALLY ALIVE

"COMPILATION" (MILLENIUM)
Releasing consistently good trance
has been the trademark of

Millenium records in this their first year of operation, and this, their ninth release so far, showcases some of the label's finest moments to date alongside some of their more recent releases. "Work My Mind" by Headman, their first release (which was remixed by Secret Knowledge, Steve Mason and Oliver Lieb) appears here in all of its original glory alongside Lieb's

exceptional "DNS" and "DNA V 2" two extraordinary tracks that rate highly alongside his previous Germanic trance excursions. John Ryman and Love Groove are both new additions to the Millenium success story, Ryman has just released his debut album via Millenium entitled "Artifices and Architecture" (reviewed last month) and one of the singles "I'll Find My Own Way Back" is featured on this CD. Love Groove fall into the joyous uplifting trance bracket and have two of their tracks featured here. Their sound could be described as Eye Q meets Platiypus. Quite excellent. The mysterious head doctor chips in with two of his most recent works, the better being the ode to Colombian marching powder enti-tled "Fantasma De Escobar" which is a powerful trance remedy that should not be underestimated, at any cost. Those of you who enjoy their music a lot faster can take refuge with the frantic by Sidharta, a monumental unorthodox piece of music that just whisks the listener away at a blistering pace. (JIVE RECORDS)

"Oh my God I think I'm having a rap attack" starts Whodini's seminal starts Whodini's seminal classic 'Magic's Wand' and the opening line perfectly sums up the contents of Jive's retrospective rap collection. Included are the commercial excursions like Jazzy Jeff & The Fresh Prince's 'Girls Ain't Nothin' But Trouble' and Newtrament's nursery rhyme parody, 'London Bridge Is Falling Down' along with harder offerings from Scholly D, Steady B and Markey Fresh. In between the old school of Kool Moe Dee and A Tribe Called Quest wax lyrics with the grand daddy and chief spokesman of the genre, BDP's and KRS-ONE's 'My Philosophy'. The break-beats mingle with ragga rhymes as the Fu-Schickens get phat on 'Ring The Alarm', a previously over looked track that thankful Jive have wisely seen fit to include along with 14 other slabs of beat box delight. If Mastercuts were to release a 'Classic Rap' compilation, you'd be forgiven for thinking this were it! 8/10 Lewis Dene

TECHNOHEAD

OUT OF CONTROL? (REACT)

The third in the series of compilations dealing with the hardcore sounds of Gabba, covers a range of the hardstuff from the slower ravey beats of around 170 bpm that open the album, to the pure dark experimentalism of the last few tracks dwelling strictly in the x-rated territory of 200bpm plus, with a strong reverence to the hardcore haven of Holland. Influid II introduce the album with a workout of untamed kicks refusing to settle at one tempo and intent on getting faster before things get underway with a party trance flavour through the help of Dyewitness. PCP's classic 6 Million ways to die by Turbulence offers a wholly different approach to the jungle cut of the same name, and is for the serious gangsters of the underground only. As well as featuring their own breakbeat Jabba on the CD from their forthcoming Datatrax Vol.2, G.T.O get busy with a remix of After Hourz from Chosen Few resulting in a hypertrance stormer guided by those distinct distorted kicks only they know how to create. For the most hardened ears, Ilsa Gold's infamous chipmunked Four non blondes comes repackaged in a far more awesome Chicago mix which, by a wise choice drops Pinky and Perky and cranks up the techno for the most astounding results. Dominee Dimitri rounds things off waving two fingers in just about every direction with an intensity designed to distress the most toughest sound. 8/10 Warlock

JANET RUSHMORE

JOY (RELEASED FOR PLEASURE) At long last one of this year's hottest dance tracks is now available in supre value '10 mix doublepack'. The Release The Pressure team have certainly done the business with this song. 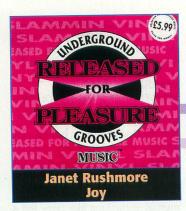
DREAM TEAM

Written and produced by Todd Terry, Kenny 'Dope' Gonzalez, Roger S. and Benji Candelario with vocal inserts from Kathy Sledge and Michael Watford, this is trainspotter heaven and the good thing about this release is that the music matches the hype. Four mixes to choose from, with Kenny's strangely titled 'Soup Mix' sitting proudly on the top of the pile. Crunching drums and Aphrohead "I Can See the Light", sit side by side with Kathy and Michael's vocals. Add to that some very special effects and a bassline from hell and the result is devastating. The Joker acquired the vocal talents of mezzo soprano Janine Roebuck who, allegedly broke off from rehearsals at Il Scala, Milan, to record this. It is different in an experimental way, but The Jokers faith in this project has paid off. The outcome is an almost acidy, perplexer type effect that thumps the bassbins in perfect sound quality, thanks mostly to that man, Mr Logan at Loft Studios, whose name is cropping up everywhere at the moment, even in soul music. I'd play it out, though this isn't normally my bag. 8/10

RONNIE SIMON "TAKE YOU THERE"

Steve Goddard

(NETWORK RECS) It seems like this has been around for ages, yet only now are people picking up on it. The initial impact of the A side gave a reminder of Sydney Youngblood's number one hit "If Only I Could", back in August 1989 and the potential is there to replicate Sydney's success. The flip's "Playboy Fully Loaded" dub, taken up drastically in pitch on the turntable, offloads a happy, bouncy groove, steered by the pulsating hi-hat. Extremely uplifting, this could be Ronnie's first major seller, with help from the radio network. 9/10 Steve Goddard

YOTHU YINDI

"TREATY" (REMIX) (MUSHROOM RÉCS) Suddenly, what was a Didgeridoo House (original track, is now something akin to Johnny Lyddon/Public Image's "Warrior" epic. It's much more rockier, with guitars and very strong Boy George Asian influences, though George has nothing to do with it. Even the chants are like those on "Warrior", sung in an abstract way. I prefer this to the original by far and it's ideal for a floor moodswing, which I do often to disperse from the

F-MACHINE

"SHE'S ALL OVER ME" (INFECTIOUS RECS) Four mixes by the Floor Federation, Secret Knowledge, Krumble and F-Machine's own, all are uniquely different. There's ambient trance and a soc called 'Leisure Lounge' (Club) treatments, none of which can be dismissed as a throw away mix. My faves are the F-Machine and Krumble variations as they are the most energetic and straightforward. The floor fed job though sounds like it was orchestrated, rather than just knocked out in a day and as such has a pedigree of its own. F-Machine's previous release, as two twelves, were equally as menacingly inticate, which only goes to show that they don't do things by halves. 10/10 Steve Goddard

PIANOMAN

"CAST A SPELL" (RUDE SEASON RECS) With the aid of Phil Hobson (Aka Nils Booph), Jammon, The Instigator, etal were responsible for the P.C.P.2, Whitney Houston "I Wanna Dance With Somebody" sampled housetrack six months back (which also contained another massive track). I mentioned earlier that the last but one track I played at Club U.K. (13th Nov) was the new softhouse mix. The last toon I played was "Cast A Spell" (with its scratches as well!) and when it ended, the audience euphoria was like the fans at Wembley after their team had just scored a goal! I was personally embarrassed by the response, though all the credit had to go to this record. So, having had just two records out, which my floors have had eargasms over plus my rave reviews, it looks like Sammon and Nils are a short step away from monumental fame. They haven't got a deal, so here's their numbers: Sammon's ???? and Phil's 01274 673992 and remember where you read about them first. (Based in Bradford). 10/10 Steve Goddard

"RICH IN PARADISE" (PLANET 4 RECS) What a good month this month has been for rereleasing/revamping old relics. Providing they're done well, there's always a demand. 20 FINGERS TO MR ROY

(SAME) (PINK VINYL PROMO) There's supposedly only 500 copies of this pressed up (as a first consignment anyway) and what a good blend these two make. This 8 tracker kicks off with an extension of his previous "Pressure" track entitled "The Matrix" which drives along at 151 bpm's. With five other tough tracks on offer including the punishing menace of "Phantom Cart" on the B side, Planet Rhythm's seventh release to date makes for a tasty morsel or three. 10/10 Barney York

AKASHA

"BEINGS FROM ANOTHER WORLD" (PHANTASM)

Phantasm are rapidly becoming a label to watch. They introduced themselves earlier this year with the superb 'Hard Trance + Psychedelic Techno' collection which boasted, amongst others, Union Jack, Pob and Hardsync. Now they're onto the second volume of that series, whilst they follow up on the singles front with this offering from Akasha. Rippling trance which falls into the clearly delineated parameters set out by Phantasm themselves and other labels like Platipus, Seismic and Millenium, 'Beings From Another World' is an excellent acidic workout with dissonant riffs and the kind of drop sections which are liable to have the floor

The F-Communication label shines gloriously yet again with an e.p. of mammoth proportions. 'The groove is going' is a flowing trance number all of 130 b.p.m.'s with chilling vox and the fattest synth that you'd kill your granny for. There's no gaps between as it glides effortlessly into the Stephan & Bruno mix with a full on snare and kickrun assault plus various chainsaw bleep sounds that'll go down a treat at most techno clubs. Even better still is the slipside 'Yes it is' which is a kind of wild pitch style affair running at approx 127 beats and featuring very clever use of vocal sample alongside tribal congas and sonic handclaps. This is definitely my fave track of the month and is more than worthy of. 10/10 Russ Cox

FAITH DEPT

"BABYLONIA" (FULL CIRCLE)

Although only recently formed we're already on release No. 4 of the label in question and this track overseen by ex-cowboys 'Faith Dept' alias Stacey Tough and Mr 'Full Circle' himself Phil Perry. Thoroughly pumping and with plenty of skank appeal from the reggae tinged B-line and cheeky organ stabs, you'll find this quite infectious. Driving hard at 132 b.p.m.s it drops in mid flight to a hair tingling spooky section

complete with lay piano riff before gradually re-ascending to full altitude and a well charged dancefloor. 'Manifestation of' on the reverse side is a much slower 110 b.p.m. groover made strictly for dub lovers and space cadets with the same reggae feel ever present. 9/10

YVES DERUYTER IV

"CALLING EARTH" (BONZAI)

A highly addictive Belgian techno thumper that bounces along at 142 b.p.m. with whistles and sirens. Check half way through when it slows right down to a halt then bangs straight back in again. Probably the most responsive tune in my box at present judging from the reaction it gets at the Soundshaft. 9/10 Russ Cox

ROY DAVIS

"WILD LIFE E.P." (SEX TRAX) Absolutely top notch U.S. tribal/acid house four tracker, each and every track a winner. 'Acid Rage' and 'Lost Voyage' sparkle most, with the former being darker and moodier and the latter more

cheery with a jolly bell melody. 'Heart Attack' is a piano led uplifting house and 'Electrical problem' is very bouncy old school techno. Must play all cuts. 9/10 Russ Cox

PSYCHIK WARRIORS OF GAIA

"PEEL SESSIONS" (KK RECORDS)

Well at long last the Psychiks have been granted a long overdue Peel session thus elevating them to cult status alongside dodgy dinosaur rock bands such as the Cure and James. This release is as avant garde and downright strange as previous Warriors' material with "Dust", the opening track for their live shows, which is a dreamy ambient soundscape ideal for any chill out zone whilst "Break" and "Pull" are more torrid affairs both sculptured around the quite distinct, tribal percussive sound that is the Warriors' trademark. 9/10 Barney York

INTERLOPER

"QUANTAM SOULS" (EAR RECORDS)

Electro Audio Response is a new label set up by those experimental techno types at Plink Plonk to facilitate the release of harder more extreme tracks. Quantam souls is the second release for the label and comes courtesy of Jon Ryman, a new producer who has recently released his first album via Millenium Records. The title track is an admirable piece of timeless techno that literally envelopes you whilst "Man 5" is a fusion of tough rugged industrial techno and electronic pulses. The final track, entitled "Hidden Empire" incorporates elements of both the previous songs yet moulds something quite thoughtprovoking and original. 8/10 Barney York

EON

"A KIND OF LIVING" (VINYL SOLUTION)

Who can forget Eon's seminal track from a couple of years ago called Spice which featured those immortal lines from the film "Dune". Well Eon has returned with another quality electronic excursion. "A Kind of Living" is a lavish four tracker featuring two remixes by "Minimal Man" (Eon and close friend Peter Ford). Part 1 drifts off into deep dubby Detroit territory whilst part 2 incorporates some of the classic "Basic Channel" trademarks. Flip to the Bside for the invigorating "Green Icing Mix" which features an interesting piano riff skanked from an early Donna Summer tune. Final track is entitled "Tanru Dub" and is as fresh and funky as a night out with George Clinton ... well almost!!!!! 8/10 Barney York

TECHNO

BLACK AND BROWN

LOGIC 1 (TRIPOLI TRAX)

The unmistakable sound of one Daz Saund, renowned for his many sets at Trade and now resident at London's Pure Groove record store where this label is based. The leading cut Moondust delivers modulating and technarchic squelch set in contrast to moments of warlike strings while the beats are mix easy roland percussion at its best. This stunning jumpy number also appears in a much more tribal housey, yet min-

imal mix on the flip before giving way to Icarus, destined to cause a more serious stir on the dancefloor. It kind of flirts between acid and trance, but comes out of the mill as good solid techno. 9/10. WARLOCK

CHRISTOPHER JUST

FORBIDDEN PLANETS (CHEAP)

Once again the Austrian label seeks to blur any generic defini-tions within the techno spectrum and succeeds quite favourably. Its use of analogue noise rudely leaps out of the speakers casting an audio shadow over its polite minimal hi hat driven beats. The labels that adorn their vinyl always inspire, recontextualising tacky images into something inspiring and dynamic. Don't ask why a band member of Kiss in their days of make-up wearing appears on the label, just accept that it looks good. Androids in Rio is the bite that will make people move, reminiscent of the Lust Probe EP on Space Works sometime ago, only this time a bit more quirky and manic with its distorted, kick sacrificed bass. Unorthodox and forward thinking techno at its best. 10/10. WARLOCK

HYBRID

VOLUME 2 (HYBRID)

If you got volume one a short while ago then you'll know what to expect with this follow up from Cari Lekebusch whose past monikers among others have been Vector and Cerebus from the mother label Planet Rhythm. There is three untitled tracks, two on the A, one on the B. The former begins with a tightly produced spaced out gurgler hypnotising with mindwarping acid, followed by a cut of string induced euphoria whose tempo descends to a halt. Meanwhile, its the b-side once again that has it all, with its funky sparse percussion and captivating warbling hookline providing a wholly different objective for techno. 9/10 WARLOCK

SUSUMU YOKOTA

B (SUBLIME)

The second release on this core Japanese label that has already featured the talents of Ken Ishi and Dan Curtain in the past. Its up to you which speed this is played on. 45rpm causes three of the four

tracks to ride in at about 150bpm with stunning effects, bar one or two sounds that as a quiet rapid squeak, voice their preference for 33rpm. Awesome full blooded kicks are the order of the day, particularly on tracks B and F, with an array of original audio headgear that offers an unassuming approach to compliment the more familiar hegemonic outputs of Germany, America and to an extent the UK. 9/10.WARLOCK

CRISTIAN VOGEL

WE EQUATE MACHINES WITH FUNK-INESS (MOSQUITO)

Certainly the man of the moment with a string of unrivalled releases under his belt when it comes to doing something radical. The intensity has been toned down from that of earlier releases resulting with a four tracker on his own label run jointly with Nick Spice, and striking a similar vibe to the recent Lambda relase on Magnetic North. Heavy rounded kicks dominate aided by a wealth of warm semi-psychadelic synth work particularly with Ninjah and Audio Morph. Your body is slower with the emphasis on a more experimental approach. Overall the clarity and definition are paramount and make for a definite worthy purchase. 9/10 WARLOCK

NERVOUS PROJECT

MONO 1 (LABWORKS UK)

This is worth searching out for the title track alone. Composed of sparse tight rhythms this is an awesome 5 minutes of untamed frequencies for the tweak happy followers of things wholly abstract. Mute fails to be so gripping, beginning with good intentions of an acid inferno but tarnished by the untimely introduction of wishy washy strings. Reflections of the heart spans the whole of the flip and carves out a journey of tripped out ambient acid. 7/10.WARLOCK

SATAN IS A BONEHEAD

(PRAXIS)

Its amazing how you can get such big beats on to the smallest of software these days. Three of the fastest and hardest tracks to emerge on the Praxis label (watch out for the excellent new fanzine 'Alien Underground' which the label is involved with) are now available on a limited edition

7inch. This provides a worthy homegrown response to the likes of Germany's Stickhead and New York's D.O.A, and hard as fuck would be considered a somewhat mild description. We praise thee is the tamest here, complete with its chainsaw-like manipulation of sounds, while second up is Sell yourself to the Devil and cranks up well in excess of 200bpm boosted by a soaring intensity that will freak the most weathered of hardcore crowds. The B-side is noise to the extreme and a beat to match. Satanists be warned. 10/10 WARLOCK

CV3303

MALICE (CAUSTIC VISIONS)

Once again this Hampshire based duo unleash a six tracker of uncompromising material only a few months after the success of their first EP on their own label. Generally the A-side deals with playable minimal techno while the B-side is where the experiments begin with all sense of beats totally disregarded. Malice maintains the harshness of their previous EP but via a more subtley sinister approach, while Clip is more hauntingly Mandatory employs a spooky acid line geared with a slower tempo and is similar to CV through 202 on the B-side which will get most of the club plays. The remainder of the flipside is where Caustic Visions come into their own. Dark ambience being the keyword here, overdosing on indulgent effects of orchestral proportions and providing the food for many a DJ intro or daring interlude. 10/10. WARLOCK

SOUNDSCAPE

DARKSIDE (INTELLIGENCE)

Otherwise known as one Craig Walsh famed for his uncompromising attitude towards music and who joins forces with the engineering talents of Jon Litchfield. The main mix alternates between gurgling synthy euro and moments of pure abstract energy, destined to raise the temperature of many a club. The B-side mix holds closer to the title in the sense of being darker by the prescence of a more aggressive kick, while Dimentional Landscape is a slower fluffed out affair, fuelled with a housey b-line to match. 7/10. WARLOCK

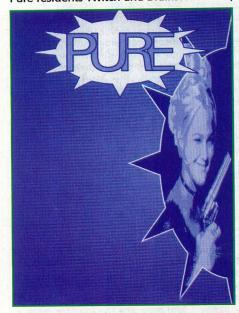

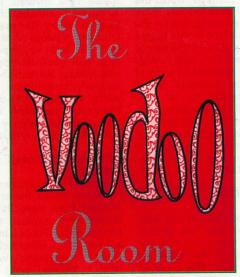

Last year's event sold out in double-quick time so make sure you've saved up the requisite £18.00 and headed off to the usual ticket outlets well beforehand.

Limbo Records help out with some Christmas gift ideas this month by unveiling a new range of merchandise. The famed, and much sought after (i.e., I don't have one) tartan record bags have finally arrived in stock, accompanied by a particularly tasteful line in fur-collared MA2 jackets. Stripey ski-hats, often in demand up the West End, are joined by some cute, hooded sweatshirts which are sure to gain you the lifelong friendship of the recipient, or at least until they unwrap something better. Mail order enquiries should be made on 041 332 4806.

The Limbo team will be travelling to the Bishopmill Hotel in Elgin on Friday 16th



December, for a special knees-up featuring the indisputable deck skills of Harri, Scott Gibson and Zammo. No Christmas would be complete without the opportunity to catch The Sub Club mainman on one of his northern jaunts, so this may well be the place to visit if you're in the region. With any luck, the trip will have been persuaded to model the label's new merchandise for prospective purchasers in the Elgin area. If not, at least you'll have had the opportunity to catch some of the best

grooves this side of Sullom Voe.

Back in Billy Kiltie's hometown of Kilmarnock, some major new developments have taken place at Paradise Park. Details are still sketchy at the moment but all will, no doubt, be revealed by the tim Jon Mancini takes to the decks there on the 3rd of December. Don't despair if you feel you've missed out on the biggest tunes around this year, though, because Club For Life residents Chris and James will be arriving on the 17th with full record boxes, one of which is bund to contain several of the contenders for the Christmas No. 1.

A new record label emerges this month, just in time to provide another essential purchase for christmas. Tropique aims to cater for discerning listeners of all persuasions, but the label's first release is of the deep house variety. Aiming at the sophisticated minimalism of labels such as Touché, they deliver an exceptional fourtrack e.p. by well-rated Glasgow outfit 4 am, which comes as a strictly limited edition. Ranging from the gorgeous tones of 'Prelude to the Storm' and 'Kingston' to stark, percussive moods 'Shipwrecked' and 'Jazz the Sea Turtle', this remarkable debut combines smokefuelled atmospheres with deep dancefloor sensibilities, making it a surefire candidate for a place under the tree on Christmas morning.

A visit to The Voodoo Room should also be pencilled in on your agenda for this month. If you haven't made it down to Cambridge Street yet, then you've missed out on several of Glasgow's finest nights this year. Recent appearances by the likes of Danny Tenaglia, Masters at Work, Frankie Knuckles and Robert Owens have elevated this relatively new club straight into the Premier League. Sunday nights at The Voodoo have assumed an almost leg-





endary reputation, not least among many of Glasgow's employers who are reportedly somewhat concerned about the remarkable rise in absenteeism on Monday mornings since the club first opened its doors in July. Investigative journalists have pointed accusing fingers in the direction of Harri and Oscar, blaming their consummate deck skills and unswerving good taste for the predicament.

As if that wasn't enough, Michael Watford and DJ Disciple make their debut Scottish appearance there on the 16th, closely followed, just in time for Christmas, by the demi-god of all things Balearic, Alfredo who'll be guesting on the 23rd.

Bomba Records return to the fray this month with a trio of singles which you'll want to check out before your finances run dry. First up is James Christian's 'Get Your Sax Off', a deep house workout which, naturally, features a slinky saxaphone riff. Berra follow up their well-rated 'June Project' with the excellent 'Chokescreen' which will, undoubtedly, feature prominently in Christmas lists this year. Finally, there's the very special remix issue of Ghasmantan's self-titled epic which comes complete with reinventions by Slam and Harri.

Orde and Stuart can, of course, be found at The Arches in Glasgow, every

Friday. Still one of the best nights on the club calendar, they'll be joined by Philadelphia's finest, Josh Wink (who delivered two of this year's finest singles in the shape of 'How's The Music' and 'Thoughts of A Tranced Love') on December 2nd. The following week they play host to the highly-rated Detroit producer Claude Young, currently receiving rave reviews for his six-tracker of deep techno house on Utensil Records, when he pays a visit on the 9th. As usual, no Christmas Eve would be complete without an extra-special Slam event and rumours are already circulating about Orde and Stuart's proposed liaison with Roy Davies Jnr, and James Lavelle at an, as of yet, unnamed venue.

Meanwhile, Soma's compilation album, featuring a selection of the very best tracks from the label's catalogue, is doing brisk business with switched-on record buyers. The perfect candidate for that more meaningful gift, it includes the likes of Slam, One Dove, Eastmen and, of course, Richie Hawtin's reworking of 'Positive Education'. And don't forget about the spectacular Rejuvination single, 'Dr Peter', which, in an ideal world, would make the Christmas top spot without any question. Joining them on the shelves this month is 'Acid Nation' by none other than Ege Bam Yasi which comes complete with a G7 mix. Those with long memories wil recall that G7 is the moniker used by Slam and Rejuvination when they work together.

Full marks to the Rosyth-based club Moist who, in recent months, have presented the varied delights of Mr. C, Murder by Sound and Lenny Dee. For a harder club which is outside the normal metropolitan circuit, it has proved itself to be a shining example of forward-thinking innovative promotion. A non-wallet crunching entry fee and an 'up-for-it' crowd are just two of the features which underline the fact that it's possible to be successful off the beaten



track. This month guests include John Berry from The Orbit in Leeds, on the 9th and Darrien Kelly who'll be paying a return visit on the 16th. Look out for an up and coming appearance from Paul Elstak and the DJ Force team.

Mark Burns and Colin Hassan, from Strawberry Bazaar, make a welcome return

this month on Out On A Limb, under the guise of Half Que - they'll be joining Manual's superb 'In Sense' in the record shop racks, if you're still searching for that last minute gift for the person in your life whose tastes run to the harder end of things. Stuart Crichton also returns on Limbo with an Anti Criminal Justice Bill outing entitled 'Justice Juice'. Along with partner Charlie Childs, Stuart is now travelling under the nom de plume of The Flange Squad. Finally, if you missed out on the exceptional debut of Glasgow's Melon Records, you'll have the opportunity to make up this month since Limbo have licensed the track for full release. Check out Melonhaus and the exceptional 'Dopamine' without delay.

The club scene in Dundee picked up recently with the opening of Beaver, a monthly night of shenanigans featuring a neat line in tough house music. They return on December 18th with very special



guest Rad Rice making a rare appearance north of the border. On recent form, notably his blinding sets at The Ministry of Sound and Education, this is one which is not to be missed. Able support is provided by Chris McGraw and Alan Livie of Trench, who, as you'll recall are signed to Eric Morillo's Strictly Rhythm subsidiary.

Finally, back in Glasgow, the Sub Club plans to make this Christmas one to remember with a breathtaking selection of festive events guaranteed to make the season go with a bang. Look out for some very special announcements over the next few weeks, but make sure you're around on 10th December when Marshall Jefferson pays a visit. And, if you haven't already checked out The Sub's Thursday night venture, UK Gold, you should be making tracks for it as soon as possible since reports are flooding in that it's one midweek club which is worth making the effort for.

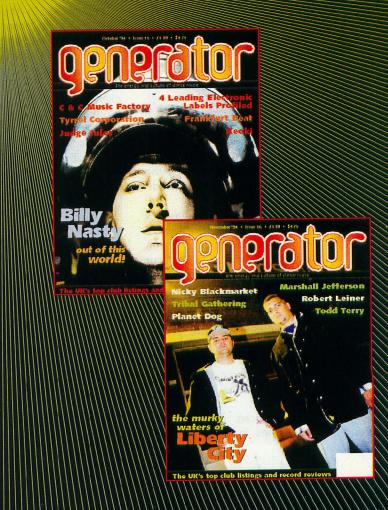

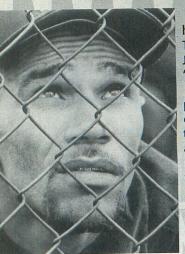

The Jung e Look



Before I even start this column I have to divert my attention to Touch magazine, or more precisely James 'No' Style's piece titled 'Jungle Warfare'.

Here's a blatant attempt by a public schoolboy at trying to be a clown. His vocabulary, references to herb and street slang all indicate an obvious pretence to street cred. His claims of jungle love and a solo visit to Lea Valley almost prove his naïvety. Goldie kicks off in style with 'Inner City Life' a good tune showing the trooper at work. It features mixes by Roni Size but the science really drops with 'Timeless'. A truly brave and brilliant effort to re-define the definition of dance. On the remix tip he's been adding his skills to the vocal efforts of Cutty Ranks, Scarface and many more. Also on London records is DJ Rap's remix of Sharon Forrester's "Love Inside."

Further big up goes to The Marvellous Cave with 'Sirens'. Ron Tom's Metamorphosis outlet lets off 'Pirates' by Metamorphosis. Ron Tom also has crisp biscuits with Horace Andy, as well as a duet with Dominick and Horace. The up and coming protoge to watch on this label is 'Edcase'. Already creating waves at Labrynth, and the old Spiral Tribe bashes, he frequently nices up

So before I drown in vinyl I leave you with 'No U-Turn' from DJ Gunshot. It uses the most used and abused sample of all time, Tenor Saw's 'Ring the Alarm', and still makes it sound good.

Partywise it's that festive season again. On Boxing Day 'Thunder and Joy' spread their vibes to Bagley's Film Studio, Kings Cross. South of the river is "Ah London Sumting", featuring top acts every Wednesday at the Vox, Brixton. It's already a month old

and receives a big thumbs up. Every Thursday it's Jungle Juice at the Broadway Rock Cafe, number ten Ealing High St. Admission is free for girlies before ten, blokes pay two quick. After ten it's a four for everyone.

The DJ's are Sub Sub, Roughneck and Chrissy D and the M.C.'s are Sensi, Para, Danger and Killer. Every Friday it's 'Jab Jungle' at The Mostyn Youth Club, Cowley Road SW9. Resident deejays are Ash-attack, Funky T, DJ Magio and MC Moose. Admission is £7.00 before midnight £10 after.

And back to last month, why was the Champagne Bash cancelled? Apparently due to a right wing meeting occurring in the West End that same evening. The Astoria have re-scheduled the evening for December, so don't worry.

Saturday 3rd December sees One Nation celebrate their birthday at The Rocket, 166-220 Holloway Road. The DJ's are Mickey

Finn, Seduction, Hype, Swann-E, DJ SS, Ray Keith and Darious D. Oh and not forgetting South Coast Supremo "vinyl groover", M.C's are Flux, Jay J, Warren G, and free'n'easy.

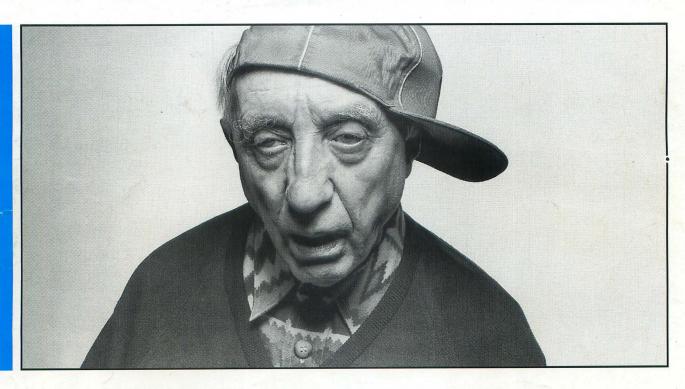
